Pledge of Allegiance

Call to Order and Roll Call

The regular meeting of the Vancouver City Council was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Mayor McEnerny-Ogle. This meeting was conducted as a hybrid meeting, including both in person and remotely over video conference.

Community Communications (Items 1-8)

Mayor McEnerny-Ogle opened Community Communication and received testimony from the following community members regarding Items 1-8:

Consent Agenda (Items 1-8)

Council requested Items 2, 4 and 7 to be pulled.

Council briefly discussed the items with staff.

Motion by Councilmember Hansen, seconded by Councilmember Perez, and approved unanimously to approve the Items on the Consent Agenda.

1. Continued use of C-101074: Sourcewell Contract 093021-ELG for the purchase of goods and services for Elgin Street sweepers

Staff Report: 187-22

The oldest street sweeper in Storm Water's fleet is due for replacement and they want to replace it with the same model of sweeper. This contract also provides price discounts for goods and services needed for maintenance and repairs. Since these purchases will exceed the current contract's \$300,000 spending threshold, we are proactively asking that this contract be amended for purchases to be made according to the departments' current authorized budget in place of setting a new spending threshold. In keeping with Fleet Service's effort to streamline the City's fleet, staff is requesting the ability to purchase from this contract and take advantage of the contract pricing.

Request: Authorize the City Manager or their designee to approve purchases under C-101074: Sourcewell 093021-ELG for the life of the contact with Owen Equipment up to the current authorized budget.

2. **OPEIU, AFSCME and JLC 2022 Market Study Implementation**

Staff Report: 188-22

The City conducted a full compensation study for all classifications related to OPEIU, AFSCME and JLC employee groups. The study compares the City's salaries for each classification to the relevant market, which is comprised of comparable public agencies located in Washington, Oregon and the Greater Portland Metropolitan area. Through market data analysis and the use of professional judgement, classifications lagging in the market are adjusted upwards in the salary table into a salary range that brings it within the market average. The study also serves to identify areas for improvement in the City's administration of its compensation and classification practices, which resulted in creating more uniformity in the naming of the classification titles.

Request: Authorize the City Manager or designee to enter into memorandums of understanding with the OPEIU, AFSCME and JLC bargaining units relative to the implementation of the results of the 2022 compensation study for the applicable classifications in the respective collective bargaining groups.

3. **NW Staffing Resources Agreement C-100478, Contract Increase**

Staff Report: 189-22

The City of Vancouver, through the Human Resources Department, currently contracts with Northwest Staffing Resources to provide staff augmentation services on an on-call, as-needed, and occasionally on-going basis. The services required may include, but are not limited to, clerical, light industrial, technical, and professional level staffing. The contract with Northwest Staffing Resources began on November 20, 2020 and ends November 19, 2025. In addition to the use of temporary staffing in support of general City operations, the need for additional temporary staffing has increased in 2022 and is anticipated to continue to support key initiatives. Recent cost drivers include temporary staff used in support the Safe Park operations. Additionally, Vancouver Police Department will utilize temporary staffing to support the processing of back-logged background checks in the hiring of new police officers. It is anticipated the contract not-to-exceed amount (C-100478) of \$1,380,000 will be exhausted by the end of November if not increased. Staff requests an increase to the authorized amount of the contract.

Request: Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute an amendment increasing the authorized not-to-exceed amount of the contract with Northwest Staffing Resources from \$1,380,000 to \$3,380,000.

4. Interagency Agreement Between the City of Vancouver and the City of Washougal Relating to Law Enforcement Services

Staff Report: 190-22

The Vancouver Police Department's Office of the Chief is currently understaffed by two Assistant Police Chiefs. The vacant Assistant Chief positions are responsible for oversight of the Administration Bureau and the Investigations Bureau. The span of control for Chief Mori and Assistant Chief Price has grown as they provide direction to the vacant bureaus. While this temporary situation was not unexpected with Chief Mori's appointment this summer, we had anticipated filling the vacant Assistant Chief positions by early November 2023. The first recruitment for Assistant Chiefs of Police did not yield any candidates. We expect to start our second recruitment for Assistant Chiefs in January 2023, with anticipated start dates in early April 2023.

Request: Authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the interagency agreement between the City of Vancouver and the City of Washougal relating to law enforcement services.

5. Adoption of Two-Year Extension of Interlocal Agreement with Clark County for Mental Health Therapeutic Court Services

Staff Report: 191-22

Clark County, as part of its criminal justice system, has a District Court Mental Health Therapeutic Court designed to assist indigent misdemeanor clients who have mental health issues. The City is providing public defense services to Mental Health Court through an interlocal agreement with Clark County. The combined contract provides sufficient funding to hire an attorney who specializes in mental health cases which provides better client services. The County, which handles both felony and misdemeanor cases and consequently has a much more extensive indigent defense program, bids out and manages the combined contract for Mental Health Court services. The initial contract period was for two years, 2015-2016 and with two (2) additional two (2) year terms. On October 10, 2016, the City Council adopted the first two-year extension for 2017-2018. On November 26, 2018, the City Council adopted the second, and last, two-year extension for 2019-2020.

On January 25, 2021, the City Council adopted a new interlocal agreement with Clark County. All details from the last interlocal agreement were carried forward into the new interlocal agreement without change, including the same payment schedule that was used in the 2019-2020 extension. The new interlocal contract period was for two years, 2021-2022, with the option for two additional two-year terms by mutual agreement. The City Council is being asked to adopt the first two-year extension, 2023-2024, to the current interlocal agreement with Clark County.

Request: On November 28, 2022, authorize the City Manager or their designee to sign an extension to the interlocal agreement with Clark County for public defense services for clients who are assigned to District Court Mental Health Therapeutic Court.

6. Release Of Covenant Running with the Land

Staff Report: 192-22

AN ORDINANCE relating to planning and zoning; approving release of a recorded covenant related to a prior rezone of property in the City of Vancouver legally described in the Covenant recorded under File No. 3752065; and establishing an effective date.

In May 2003, the City approved the site plan for the Wellons Industrial Project (PRJ2002-00569/FSR2003-00015). The approval included conditions requiring the applicant to commit to the completion of certain transportation improvements associated with the City's then planned NW 26th Avenue Industrial corridor. In November 2003, the developer executed a Covenant Running with the Land that placed restrictions on the subject parcels in such a manner so as to guarantee the future completion of the required transportation improvements.

In the years since, the City has modified the plans for a NW 26th Avenue freight corridor, shifting the alignment for this corridor to NW 32nd Avenue. As such, the requirements stipulated in the 2003 site plan approval and contained within the 2003 Covenant are no longer applicable. In addition, the subject properties are proceeding through a new site plan review, which will feature all required transportation improvements associated with the City's current plans for NW 32nd Avenue.

The attached ordinance releases the 2003 Covenant and removes all associated requirements and restrictions from the subject parcels.

Request: On November 28, 2022, approve the ordinance releasing the subject property from the 2003 Covenant Running with the

Land on first reading, setting the second reading and public hearing for Monday, December 5, 2022.

7. An Ordinance Creating a Compost Procurement Policy for the Procurement and Use of Compost in Qualifying City Projects

Staff Report: 193-22

AN ORDINANCE relating to the adoption of compost procurement requirements and establishing a compost procurement policy for the City of Vancouver as more particularly described herein.

In March 2022, the Washington state legislature passed ESSHB1799, signed into law by the Governor and codified in June 2022. Compliance with the requirements of the law, known as the Organics Management law is included in the City's solid waste section of the draft Climate Action Framework. The new law includes a provision (Part 7) that requires local governments to adopt a CPO and develop a policy for the procurement of compost to be used in projects, as well as track and report to Ecology total tons of organic materials diverted from the landfill, including the amount of compost purchased from specific sources.

The new statute states:

The legislature finds that landfills are a significant source of emissions of methane, a potent greenhouse gas (GHG). Among other economic and environmental benefits, the diversion of organic materials to productive uses will reduce methane emissions.

In order to reduce methane emissions associated with organic materials, the legislature finds that it will be beneficial to improve a variety of aspects of how organic materials and organic material wastes are reduced, managed, incentivized, and regulated under state law. Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature to support the diversion of organic materials from landfills through a variety of interventions to support productive uses of organic material wastes, including: . . .

(h) Encouraging cities and counties to procure more of the compost and finished products created from their organic material wastes in order to support the economic viability of processes to turn organic materials into

finished products and increasing the likelihood that composting and other responsible organic material management options are economically viable.

The Organics Management law, now codified in RCW 43.19A.150, requires cities such as Vancouver to “adopt a compost procurement ordinance to implement RCW 43.19A.120 by January 1, 2023. This section applies to a city or county with a population greater than 25,000, as measured by Washington’s Office of Financial Management; and to each city or county in which organic material collection services are provided under chapter 70A.205 RCW.

This statute further states that when “planning government-funded projects or soliciting and reviewing bids for such projects, all state agencies and local governments shall consider whether compost products can be utilized in the project.” If it is determined that compost products can be used, then they must be used unless certain exceptions related to cost, availability, and quality apply.

Beginning December 31, 2024, Vancouver must report to Ecology on the quantities of organics materials diverted from the landfill, as well as the volume, cost and source of compost used in projects annually.

In conclusion, the proposed ordinance seeks to comply to state law regarding compost procurement requirements and meet the timeline for adopting an ordinance by January 1, 2023. Staff anticipate returning to City Council to codify this CPO as part of the City’s future procurement ordinance anticipated in 2023.

Request: On November 28, 2022, approve ordinance on first reading, setting date of second reading and public hearing for December 5, 2022.

Public Hearings (Item 9)

9. Kirkland Tower MFTE Certificate Extension Request

Staff Report: 187A-22

A RESOLUTION of the City Council of the City of Vancouver approving a Multi-Family Housing Limited Property Tax Exemption Extension Agreement (the “MFTE Extension” attached hereto as Exhibit A) with Waterfront Holdings Group I, a Washington limited liability company (“Applicant”), and any successors in interest or assigns (“Applicant”), and the CITY OF VANCOUVER, a Washington municipal corporation (“City”) pursuant to that certain Multi-Family Housing Limited Property Tax Exemption Agreement dated February 23, 2017, which was recorded on Applicant’s property located at 590 Waterfront Way (MFTE Extension, Attachment 1) on May 18, 2017 (“Original MFTE Agreement”).

The purpose of this action is to extend the Kirkland Tower MFTE certificate eligibility, which has expired as a result of unexpected project delays. The project’s MFTE application expired on July 23, 2022, and Council action is necessary for the project to remain eligible for the tax exemption available under the MFTE program.

The Kirkland Tower project occupies Block 4 on the Waterfront at the corner of Esther Street and Columbia Way and includes a hotel (Indigo) and a 40-unit condominium tower. Kirkland applied for an 8-year MFTE tax exemption for the condominium tower in October 2016, and City Council approved the related agreement on February 23, 2017. At the time of application, the MFTE benefit was available to market rate projects without a public benefit contribution. Once an MFTE agreement is approved, a project must receive at least a temporary certificate of occupancy from the City of Vancouver within three years (not including allowed extensions) for a final MFTE certificate to be issued.

Kirkland's initial certificate was to expire on February 23, 2020. Kirkland requested a two-year extension. Under State law and corresponding Vancouver Municipal Code, a two-year extension may be granted by the City administratively provided that external issues are involved beyond the applicant’s control, the applicant is moving forward in good faith, and that the original agreement outcomes remain unchanged. Under this authority, and the applicant's progress with construction, the City granted an extension until February 23, 2022.

Less than a month after that extension went into effect, the Covid-19 pandemic hit. During the ensuing two-year period, the project was delayed by stay at home and construction stop directives from the Governor, as well as materials and workforce delays. Additionally, challenges in installing, testing and permitting the project's complex fire suppression system also began to emerge. Kirkland, anticipating that it would not meet the February 23, 2022, deadline, requested another extension.

In recognition of statewide related delays in construction, Washington State Legislature amended State law in July 2021 to provide municipalities the option to extend eligibility for COVID-impacted MFTE projects by 5 years beyond the initial 3-year completion window. This new extension was only available to projects in the MFTE pipeline prior to the onset of the COVID pandemic. Based on this new State law, the City issued administratively another extension to the project through July 23, 2022. The proposed extension effectively puts the project at 3.25 years of the allowed 5-year Covid extension.

On the opinion of the City Attorney, it was determined that any further extensions should be reviewed and approved by City Council rather than administratively.

As the project status stands now, all the physical building elements are complete, furniture is being moved in, fencing around the building has been removed, and final sidewalk improvements are complete. The primary milestone before issuance of the temporary certificate of occupancy was a successful test and inspection of the building's fire-life-safety system. The test was successfully completed and the temporary certificate of occupancy for the main floor and common areas was issued November 4, 2022. The applicant is now completing minor punch-list items and will receive occupancy of the residential units on a floor-by-floor basis. Once the applicant completes the minor permit punch-list items the project can receive the full certificate of occupancy.

Similar to current market rate MFTE projects, the applicant is providing \$537,500 (25% of the expected foregone tax revenue) towards infrastructure projects adjacent to its property, including improvements to the roundabout at Esther Street and Columbia Way and traffic calming along Waterfront Way, and designates the City to complete the above projects. The applicant will make payments of \$13,427.50 per unit to the City as final certificates of tax exemption are issued for individual condominiums, but the total amount due to City must be paid no later than the expiration of the proposed 10-month extension on May 23, 2023.

Request: Adopt a Resolution approving Multifamily Housing Limited Property Tax Exemption extension and authorizing the City Manager or their designee to sign the additional extension.

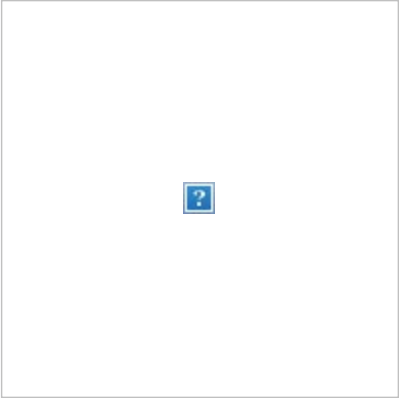

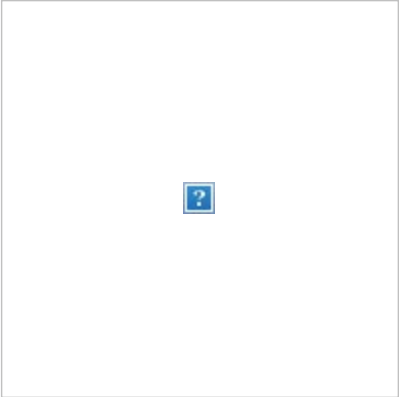
