Call to Order and Roll Call

The regular meeting of the Vancouver City Council was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Mayor McEnerny-Ogle. This meeting was conducted as a hybrid meeting, including both in person and remotely over video conference.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Hansen, and carried unanimously to excuse Councilmember Harless.

Approval of Minutes

Minutes - August 14, 2023

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Perez, and carried unanimously to approve the meeting minutes of August 14, 2023.

Consent Agenda (Items 1-8)

Council requested items 5 and 6 be pulled for discussion.

Motion by Councilmember Fox, seconded by Councilmember Paulsen, and carried unanimously to approve items 1, 2, 3, 4, 7, and 8 on the Consent Agenda.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Paulsen, and carried unanimously to approve item 5 on the Consent Agenda.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Paulsen, and carried unanimously to approve item 6 on the Consent Agenda.

1. **Construction Acceptance - NE 58 and Andresen Sanitary Sewer Improvements**

Staff Report: 157-23

North Cascades Excavating of Woodland, WA has completed construction of the NE 58th & Andresen Sanitary Sewer Improvement project. The project installed 2,221 linear feet of 8-inch gravity main to make sewer service available to 26 parcels.

The work was completed satisfactorily in accordance with the plans and specifications. Contract costs are summarized below:

The original contract amount, including sales tax, was \$532,167.68. The final project cost was \$841,056.46, which was \$308,888.78 (approximately 58%) over the original contracted amount. The difference is attributed to an increase in the pavement restoration for the majority of the project. Restoration that was identified in the contract documents was determined to not be adequate after construction of the underground work due to unanticipated pavement failures, so the limits were increased and the method modified, which caused the increase in cost.

The apprenticeship utilization required for this project, based on the engineer's estimate, was 3%. The actual utilization by the contractor was 1%. As policy requires, a deduction for the underutilization was applied to the contract and is reflected in the table above.

Request: On August 28, 2023, accept the facilities as constructed by North Cascade Excavating of Woodland, WA, and authorize release of the retainage subject to receipt of all documentation required by law.

2. Construction Acceptance - Vista Robles Sanitary Sewer Improvements

Staff Report: 158-23

Parker Pacific Development of Lake Oswego, OR has completed construction of the Vista Robles Sanitary Sewer Improvement project. The project installed 355 linear feet of 8-inch gravity main, as well as 622 Linear feet of public pressure main to make sewer service available to 27 parcels. The work was completed satisfactorily in accordance with the plans and specifications. Contract costs are summarized below:

The original contract amount, including sales tax, was \$446,807.83. The final project cost was \$430,596.89, which was \$16,210.94 under (approximately 4%) the original contracted amount. The difference can be attributed to

unforeseen conditions that required less gravity sewer to be installed and more public pressure sewer.

Based on the engineers estimate, this project fell below the threshold for an Apprenticeship Utilization requirement.

Request: On August 28, 2023, accept the facilities as constructed by Parker Pacific Development of Lake Oswego, OR, and authorize release of the retainage subject to receipt of all documentation required by law.

3. Construction Acceptance - Southside Interceptor Cured-In-Place-Pipe Rehabilitation Phase 2

Staff Report: 159-23

Allied Trenchless of Chelan, Washington, has completed construction of the Southside Interceptor CIPP (Cured-In-Place-Pipe) Rehabilitation Phase 2 project. The project installed a 36-inch UV Cured-In-Place Liner within 2,753 feet of an interceptor that conveys a large percentage of the total wastewater into the Westside Reclamation Facility.

The work was completed satisfactorily in accordance with the plans and specifications. Contract costs are summarized below:

The original contract amount, including sales tax, was \$976,348.10. The final project cost was \$1,019,530.94, which was \$43,182.84 (over 4%) more than the original contracted amount. The increase can be attributed to unforeseen changes in quantities during the construction process.

An apprenticeship waiver was approved for this project due to the very low labor hours and high material costs.

Request: On August 28, 2023, accept the facilities as constructed by Allied Trenchless of Chelan, Washington, and authorize release of the retainage bond subject to receipt of all documentation required by law.

4. Construction Acceptance - Southside Interceptor Cured-In-Place-Pipe Rehabilitation Phase 3

Staff Report: 160-23

Allied Trenchless of Wenatchee, Washington, has completed construction of the Southside Interceptor Cured-In-Place-Pipe Rehabilitation Phase 3 project. The project installed a 36-inch and 33-inch UV Cured-In-Place Liner within 3,229 feet of the Southside Interceptor, which conveys a large percentage of the total wastewater into the Westside Reclamation Facility. The work was completed satisfactorily in accordance with the plans and specifications. Contract costs are summarized below:

The original contract amount, including sales tax, was \$1,734,746.83. The final project cost was \$1,861,612.82, which was \$126,865.99 (over 7%) more than the original contracted amount. The increase can be attributed to unforeseen changes in quantities during the construction process.

An apprenticeship waiver was approved for this project due to the very low labor hours and high material costs.

Request: On August 28, 2023, accept the facilities as constructed by Allied Trenchless of Wenatchee, Washington, and authorize release of the retainage bond subject to receipt of all documentation required by law.

5. Bid Award for the Fourth Plain Blvd. – Main St to Fort Vancouver Way National Highway System Resurfacing Project per Bid #ITB 23-16

Staff Report: 161-23

The Fourth Plain Blvd. – Main St to Fort Vancouver Way NHS Resurfacing Project is being constructed as part of the Pavement Management program. This project involves paving with hot mix asphalt along the Fourth Plain corridor. The current year pavement management program includes two separate resurfacing contracts. A total of 28 lanes miles of street will be paved under those contracts. These contracts include the “2023 Resurfacing Project” and the “Fourth Plain Blvd – Main St to Fort

Vancouver Way NHS Resurfacing Project". This staff report is only for the Fourth Plain Blvd. – Main St to Fort Vancouver Way NHS Resurfacing Project. The 2023 Resurfacing project has already been awarded by Council and is under construction.

The attached vicinity map shows where the paving will occur along Fourth Plain.

On August 15, 2023 the City received 2 bids for the subject project. The bids ranged from \$1.482 to \$1.509 million dollars. The low bidder was responsive. The bids are as follows:

Due to the federal funding associated with this project, the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) set an Underutilized Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (UDBE) goal of 13%. Lakeside Industries Inc. has committed to meet this goal. Although this project has not been assigned a federal training requirement, federal guidelines for grant projects do not allow the inclusion of local agency apprenticeship programs. Consequently, there are no City apprenticeship goals for this project.

Request: On August 28, 2023, award a construction contract for the Fourth Plain Blvd – Main St to Fort Vancouver Way NHS Resurfacing Project to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, Lakeside Industries, Vancouver, Washington, at their bid price of \$1,482,481.00, which includes Washington State sales tax, and authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the same.

6. Bid Award for Safe Stay Community, Site 3, per Bid # 23-32

Staff Report: 162-23

A part of the Vancouver Homelessness Plan calls for the establishment of Safe Stay Community sites where residents are provided shelter and

personal hygiene facilities and are given access to social service providers to assist them in transitioning to permanent housing.

To date, two Safe Stay Communities have been established, the third is waiting on this bid award to start construction, and the fourth is in the final stages of the site plan layout. A fifth site is included in the budget, but a site has not been selected.

Each Safe Stay Community typically features 20 shelters capable of housing two persons each, one office, community spaces, restroom & sanitation units, storage facilities and garbage services.

On August 15, 2023, the City received three bids for the subject project. The bids ranged between \$708,307.68 and \$862,215.87. The apparent low bidder was deemed responsive. A summary of the bids are as follows:

City Electric Co. has submitted an apprenticeship plan and intends to meet the required apprenticeship goal of 3%.

Request: On August 28, 2023, award a construction contract for the Safe Stay Community Site 3 project to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, City Electric Co. of Ridgefield, WA, at their bid price of \$708,307.68, which includes Washington State sales tax, and authorize the City Manager or designee to execute the same.

7. Culture, Arts and Heritage Commission Cultural Grant Proposals

Staff Report: 155A-23

A RESOLUTION awarding City of Vancouver cultural grants for 2023 as recommended by the Culture, Arts and Heritage Commission.

This item was presented with the consent agenda on August 21, 2023 but was remanded to staff to resolve a procedural error concerning the grant

approval process.

On April 16, 2018 the City Council adopted a new Culture, Arts and Heritage Plan. The plan lays out three elements in its six-year action plan, one of which is to “Build Cultural Capacity.” Restarting the City’s cultural grant program was identified as a key action to reach that goal, under Objective 1.3: Expand City-supported arts and cultural programs.

The City launched the new cultural grant program in July 2019 and received sixteen grant applications from non-profit and governmental organizations, awarding a total of \$122,255. A range of projects were supported including the creation of historical exhibits, installation of sculptures and murals, and interactive experiences including performances and cultural events, among others. Funding for the program was redirected in spring 2020 as the City responded to early financial impacts of the pandemic.

Funding for the cultural grant program was restored in the 2023-2024 biennial budget process. This allowed the City to relaunch the cultural grant program in April 2023 and we received nineteen grant applications from non-profit and governmental organizations totaling \$158,965. The Culture, Arts and Heritage Commission reviewed the proposals based on the following criteria: proposals should elevate Vancouver’s livability, foster a vibrant and diverse community, exemplify the best of Vancouver’s creative community, and demonstrate innovative collaboration. The Commission voted on the proposals at its July 13, 2023 meeting and is recommending funding for fifteen of the grants, at a total of \$92,100. The funding is on a reimbursable basis and grant recipients must enter into a grant agreement with the City. The Cultural, Art and Heritage Commission also recommended a direct commitment of \$25,000 to the Vancouver Art and Music Festival. This Festival is one of the Commission’s highest priorities and the committed funds specifically supported twenty-five local artists who performed at the festival. Funding that is not being allocated to this year’s projects will be rolled into next year’s program.

Request: On August 28, 2023, approve the 2023 cultural grants as recommended by the Culture, Arts and Heritage Commission, ratify and confirm the twenty-five issued grants, and authorize the City Manager or designee to execute grant agreements consistent with the awards.

DOC never reached out to any City, County, State, or Fire District officials and asked or included them prior to this out-of-the-blue announcement on July 26, 2023, at 6:32 AM by email to staff. We, the undersigned members of the Clark County Delegation, are writing to express our strong opposition to the planned closure of Larch Correctional Center (LCC) in October 2023 by the Department of Corrections (DOC).

LCC plays a crucial role in our community by providing family wage jobs and valuable rehabilitation training opportunities for incarcerated individuals. The dedicated forest firefighting crews and inmate work crews at Larch have been instrumental in saving the state millions of dollars through forest and stream restoration efforts.

The closure would impede positive relationships and hinder efforts to reduce recidivism since access to visitation is crucial for incarcerated individuals. LCC is the only DOC facility in Southwest Washington, allowing most incarcerated individuals to have family nearby. Closing LCC would result in sending them to facilities much further away, reducing their visitation rates and weakening community ties.

Larch plays an essential role in transitioning incarcerated individuals by providing mental health services and addiction treatment, reflecting our commitment to community-level care. Moving towards warehousing individuals would be a step backward and compromise safety. The unique opportunities and personal guidance offered at LCC are challenging to replicate in larger facilities, making it an essential rehabilitation center for the DOC.

Additionally, the relationship between LCC and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is vital. Incarcerated individuals working on DNR crews receive invaluable character development and self-worth, helping fight forest wildfires and safeguarding nearby communities. While other camps have some DNR crew relationship, they lack the same level of medical care and are located in the NW region of the state, making Larch's presence in SW Washington even more crucial.

In light of these concerns, we urge you to reconsider the decision to close Larch Correctional Center (LCC) and work towards preserving its invaluable contributions to our community and the state at large.

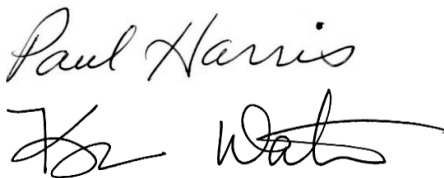
