

April 20, 2020 - City Council Meeting Minutes

COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING

Call to Order and Roll Call

The regular meeting of the Vancouver City Council was called to order at 6:30 p.m. by Mayor McEnerny-Ogle. The meeting was conducted remotely over conference call.

Approval of Minutes

Minutes - April 6, 2020

Motion by Councilmember Paulsen, seconded by Councilmember Lebowsky, and carried unanimously to approve the meeting minutes of April 6, 2020.

Mayor McEnerny-Ogle noted a staff request to amend the Consent Agenda to add a walk-on item for adoption of a resolution authorizing a grant application to the Washington State Historical Society for the Grant House roof replacement.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and carried unanimously to amend the agenda to add the walk-on item (as described above) to the Consent Agenda.

Citizen Communication (Items 1-8) - see general protocol outlined above

Mayor McEnerny-Ogle opened Citizen Communication to those members of the public who had pre-registered to testify and received the following testimony:

- Glen Yung, Vancouver, spoke regarding Items 7 and 8. In regards to Item 7, he spoke in favor for not extending the Evergreen-grand development moratorium at this time due to the current economic uncertainty. He also urged the City to consider impacts to individual property owners in the future when considering similar moratoria. Regarding Item 8, Mr. Yung urged the City to carefully consider which programs and projects should be moving forward at this time due to the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

There being no further testimony, Mayor McEnerny-Ogle closed Citizen Communication.

Consent Agenda (Items 1-8)

Councilmember Glover asked whether she should recuse herself from discussion or action on the walk-on item, as she sits on the Board of Directors for the Historic Trust. Mr. Young explained that because this item only gives staff the authority to apply for a grant, she does not need to recuse herself. If an agreement comes to Council for this grant in the future, she may need to recuse herself depending on the specifics of that agreement.

Council requested Items 3-7 be pulled for separate discussion, as summarized below.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Glover, and carried unanimously to approve Items 1-6, 8, and the walk-on item.

1. Approval of an Extension and Increase to an Existing Contract with Gordon Truck Centers 01513

Staff Report 043-20

Summary

The City uses State of Washington contract #01513 with Gordon Truck

Centers doing business as Freightliner Northwest for purchase of heavy duty truck chassis, parts, and accessories for various replacements.

Equipment Services would like authorization to extend the contract term by an additional year beyond the current expiration date of 6/13/2020 and to increase the not-to-exceed threshold of the contract by \$300,000.

The City will only make high priority purchases under this contract, in light of the current budget situation.

Request: Authorize a one year extension of the contract and an increase to the maximum authorized amount under the Washington State Contract #01513 with Gordon Truck Centers doing business as Freightliner Northwest of Pacific, Washington.

Motion approved the request.

2. Professional services agreements (PSAs) for on-call professional construction management and inspection.

Staff Report 044-20

Summary

Since 1999, the City of Vancouver's Public Works Department has had contracts with various companies for the provision of professional construction management and inspection services using "on-call" procedures. On-call procedures allow for a master contract establishing rates and scope to be executed, but no work done or costs incurred until a project specific "task order" is issued. There are no costs or budgetary impacts until there is a task order for an active project. Since 1999, the City has had five different competitive processes to establish rosters of the most qualified companies to provide the needed services.

Most recently, in 2015, City Council authorized the establishment of five "on-call" contracts for professional construction management and inspection. These contracts were designed to provide the Construction Services Division of Public Works with maximum flexibility in staffing projects with professionals competent in the fields of construction management and inspection. These contracts were very successful in providing the City of Vancouver with flexibility in staffing projects during times of peak workload. All of these contracts will expire in July 2020.

In December of 2019, proposals were requested for similar contracts for 2020 through 2022 with extensions through 2024 possible. Proposal

responses were received from 10 companies. After a review of all proposals, six companies have been selected for proposed professional service contracts. The six companies are: OTAK of Vancouver, Harper Houf Peterson Righellis of Vancouver, MacKay and Sposito of Vancouver, Wallis Engineering of Vancouver, JD Joice and Associates of Battle Ground, and Exeltech of Lacey.

- Request:
1. Authorize the City Manager to enter into professional services agreements with OTAK of Vancouver, Harper Houf Peterson Righellis of Vancouver, MacKay and Sposito of Vancouver, Wallis Engineering of Vancouver, JD Joice and Associates of Battle Ground, and Exeltech of Lacey for the provision of specialized project inspection and/or administration on an as-needed basis for three years in an amount not to exceed \$950,000 for the life of each contract. Authorize the City Manager to extend the duration of such contracts for up to two additional years by separate written amendment and authorize the City Manager to approve any legal action necessary to enforce the terms of such contracts.
 2. Authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to activate services to be provided under these contracts with a series of specific task orders. The task order proposal provides for timely “as-needed” service provision, but within the framework, scope, and limitations of the overall master contract.

Motion approved the request.

3. Air Encroachment Agreement for Block 20

Staff Report 045-20

Summary

The owners of Block 20 are currently working on pouring the foundation and parking lot slab and will soon need to proceed with the upper floors. The grantees in the agreement are: TC Waterfront LLC, CG Waterfront LLC and JSP Waterfront LLC.

Parks and Recreation Department staff has agreed to the terms of the agreement and have worked with the City's Legal staff and the grantees on the agreement.

- Request: Authorize the City Manager to execute the Air Rights

Easement Agreement with Waterfront LLCs and authorize any subsequent legal action necessary to enforce the terms of the same.

Julie Hannon, Parks and Recreation Director, 487-8309

Councilmember Stober asked for clarification on the timing of this item, noting that the project has already started and asking why the City would be negotiating the air space now.

Ms. Hannon explained City staff has been negotiating this agreement with the developers for some time now, and the developers have been aware that there would be charges related to the air encroachment. She stated the delay has been partly due to staff capacity to bring the agreement forward to Council.

Motion approved the request.

4. **2020-2022 Collective Bargaining Agreement between the City and the Vancouver Police Officers Guild**

Staff Report 046-20

Summary

The labor agreement between the City and the Vancouver Police Officer's Guild bargaining unit expired on December 31, 2019. The parties were able to work through a collaborative process and consensual decision making on many of the provisions for a new three-year agreement. The labor agreement is being brought to Council for approval.

Request: On April 20, 2020, authorize the City Manager or his designee to execute and ratify the 2020-2022 Collective Bargaining Agreement with the Vancouver Police Officer's Guild.

Lisa Takach, Human Resources Director, 487-8611

Councilmember Stober stated he is extremely excited to have this contract come before Council for the City's police officers, and noted there has been a total positive transformation in the relationship between the City and the union. He stated the staff report for this item notes the City will pay 100 percent of officers' insurance premiums, with employees paying 10 percent of costs for dependents. He asked where in the contract the 100 percent coverage is outlined, as he could not find this provision explicitly stated in the contract language.

Ms. Takach stated the City has been paying the full premium for officers for some time now, and 90 percent of costs for dependents. She stated the contract language could be tightened up perhaps under the next contract

cycle, but confirmed this has been the insurance programs officers have been receiving for a number of contract cycles and the practice and interpretation of the contract language has been consistent over the years.

Motion approved the request

5. Affordable Housing Fund Contract Amendment - Vancouver Housing Authority Valley Homestead Shelter Rehabilitation

Staff Report 047-20

Summary

The City of Vancouver awarded \$252,533 in 2017 Affordable Housing Funds to the Vancouver Housing Authority (VHA) for the Valley Homestead Shelter Rehabilitation project in 2018. Valley Homestead is a 50-bed shelter owned by the VHA and operated by Share that serves families with children and single women.

The Affordable Housing Fund contract for Valley Homestead was executed in October 2018. The scope of work, as amended, includes kitchen, restroom, common space, accessibility, HVAC, plumbing, heating, insulation, and parking lot improvements; a new play structure and basketball court; and an increase in rooms to provide space for 12 additional beds.

The City also awarded \$219,104 in 2017 Affordable Housing Funds to the VHA for the SafeChoice Rehabilitation Project via a contract executed in October 2018. The VHA has requested to cancel this contract and move the full amount to the Valley Homestead contract. The VHA will use its own funding to complete the SafeChoice project. SafeChoice is owned by the VHA and managed by the YWCA. It provides 34 beds for victims of domestic violence. The planned shelter improvements include an interior hall extension to a new exterior door, expanded exterior hard-surface patios, an accessible route to amenities and playground equipment, and perimeter security privacy fencing.

The change would increase the Valley Homestead contract amount to \$471,637. The Affordable Housing Fund contract for SafeChoice would be canceled. These changes reduce the accounting and monitoring burden for both parties, while allowing SafeChoice and Valley Homestead projects to be completed as planned. The VHA anticipates completing both projects in summer 2020.

Request: Authorize the City Manager to: execute a notice of termination with SafeChoice; sign an amendment to the contract between the City and Vancouver Housing Authority for the Valley Homestead shelter improvement project to increase the

amount of the Affordable Housing Fund award from \$252,533 to \$471,637; and authorize any legal action necessary to enforce the terms of the foregoing documents.

Peggy Sheehan, Community Development Programs Manager, 487-7952

Councilmember Stober asked for clarification as to why the City is recommending the change to this Affordable Housing Fund contract and what the benefits are.

Ms. Sheehan explained the City awarded the Vancouver Housing Authority (VHA) funds for both the SafeChoice and Homestead projects, and to simplify the contracts, the City is proposing to provide most of the funding for the Homestead project through the Affordable Housing Fund and VHA could use rehabilitation money for the SafeChoice project. Ms. Sheehan explained this benefits the City because staff will only have to monitor one project, including the prevailing wage requirements and the ongoing monitoring through the affordable housing funds.

Councilmember Lebowsky asked whether VHA just encountered this issue after the fact and decided to put it into one contract to move the money. Ms. Sheehan explained that when the VHA got to construction with the SafeChoice project, they discovered they needed more money to make that project work, and acquired that funding through other sources. The funding from the City for Homestead will be available in the next few months, whereas the funding for SafeChoice will take quite a bit longer.

Motion approved the request.

6. Seventh Amendment to the Professional Services Agreement No. 80989 (Now 88635) with American Medical Response (AMR) for Ambulance Services

Staff Report 048-20

Summary

On November 10, 2014, the City Council authorized the City Manager to enter into a five year Agreement with an additional five-year possible extension. The Contract became effective January 1, 2015. On December 17, 2018, the City Council authorized the City Manager to enter into a five-year extension to the Agreement.

On March 31, 2020, AMR requested temporary modifications to AMR's obligations under the Agreement because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The City and AMR agree these modifications are needed only until such time as the pandemic is declared over, though one modification (a relaxation of

mileage and age limits for three AMR ambulances) is extended until the end of 2020 to account for manufacturing delays in light of the pandemic. The purpose behind the modifications is due to the reduction of volume in terms of transports, but an increase in responses due to people seeking medical attention but wanting to avoid hospitals.

The modifications are set forth in the attached Seventh Amendment to the Ambulance Services Agreement. Each modification is focused on permitting Basic Life Service response for lower priority calls. The Sixth Amendment to the Agreement requires that all subsequent amendments be presented to Council for approval.

Request: Authorize the City Manager to execute the attached Seventh Amendment to the Professional Services Agreement No. 80989 (Now 88635) with AMR for Ambulance Services.

Joe Molina, Vancouver Fire Chief, 487-7201

Councilmember Stober asked staff to provide a brief overview of why this contract amendment is coming forward.

Chief Molina stated the updated provisions were put into practice early on in the pandemic response at AMR's request in order to allow additional life support resources, not knowing what the pandemic response would need to be locally in the short term and also related to the uncertainty of the supply chain for replacement units in the long term.

Councilmember Stober noted that one of the stated purposes for the modification is related to the reduction in transport volume but an increase in responses to people needing medical attention but who want to avoid the hospital. He asked whether that is something first responders have been seeing in the community. Chief Molina stated that over the last month, AMR anticipated about one thousand transports that did not happen. He said staff had expected that might happen but was surprised to the degree at which it did happen. He explained ambulances are still being dispatched to calls, and the medical program director in conjunction with Clark County Public Health has created protocol by which responders can talk with the patient and review symptoms with the hospital or the patient's primary care provider, if necessary, to determine whether that person should be transported to the hospital. He explained that both call volumes and transports have decreased, but the transports have drastically decreased.

Motion approved the request.

- 7. Potential expiration of previously scheduled six-month extension of a temporary moratorium on acceptance and processing of**

applications for permits for new or expanded developments, or subdivisions, generally located on Evergreen Boulevard from V Street to Grove Street, and Grand Boulevard from Evergreen to Mill Plain

Staff Report 049A-20

AN ORDINANCE continuing a temporary moratorium for the duration of six additional months upon the acceptance and processing of applications for permits for the development of new structures; the expansion of existing structures; or subdivisions in the Evergreen and Grand Commercial Corridors as defined herein; establishing six months as the tentative effective period of this ordinance; and establishing an immediate effective date.

Summary

The current moratorium prohibits the acceptance and processing of new applications for permits for new development or expansion of structures through May 4, 2020. The potential ordinance attached would provide an additional six months to develop recommendations for appropriate land uses, building orientation, and other related streetfront, parking, and access considerations, and to continue ongoing public and stakeholder engagement through additional virtual and on-line community input opportunities to evaluate and refine options and recommendations.

Request: On April 20, 2020, direct staff to not bring forward an ordinance extending the moratorium.

Bryan Snodgrass, Principal Planner, 487-7946; Rebecca Kennedy, Long Term Planning Manager, 487-7896

Mr. Holmes explained that when the agenda and supporting materials for this item were first published, the recommendation from staff was to extend this moratorium for six months; however, in the following days after receiving further information the recommendation was updated to request Council let the moratorium expire but allow the planning work to continue.

Ms. Kennedy provided background information on the commercial corridors strategy and the public engagement to date for this particular corridor. She stated staff received very productive feedback, but the environment has changed significantly since the planning effort began, and the appropriate response at this time is to allow the moratorium to expire and provide property owners the most flexibility possible in regards to their property given the economic uncertainty of the coming months.

Councilmember Fox supported allowing the moratorium to expire, as businesses need the ability to respond to the economic situation. She also stated she does not have confidence the planning effort could efficiently move forward in the next six month due to uncertainties related to City staff capacity

and City resources.

Councilmember Stober asked how housing affordability in the Hudson's Bay area plays into this planning effort, if at all. Ms. Kennedy stated this initiative is really focused on the commercial corridor. There could be some housing involved, but it would be mostly commercial. She noted the focus has not been on affordability but enhancing the neighborhood district and fitting commercial projects within the unique character of the community. She stated the current zoning could allow some low-income multifamily housing above commercial projects, thereby increasing affordable housing options in the area.

Motion by Councilmember Stober, seconded by Councilmember Lebowsky, and carried unanimously to not extend the moratorium.

8. Approval of Claim Vouchers

Request: Approve claim vouchers for April 20, 2020.

Motion approved claim vouchers for April 20, 2020, in the amount of \$10,244,117.94.

WALK-ON ITEM - Washington State Historical Society Grant for Grant House roof

A RESOLUTION authorizing the City of Vancouver to apply for a Heritage Capital Projects grant from the Washington State Historical Society to fund the replacement of the Grant House roof on Officers Row; providing for severability and an effective date.

Request: Adopt a resolution supporting the City applying for a 2021-2023 Heritage Capital Projects grant from Washington State Historical Society for replacement of the roof on the Grant House.

Ms. Bader provided an overview of the changed application process for this grant, which now requires a Council resolution approving of the application be included at the time the City submits its letter of intent to apply.

Motion adopted Resolution M-4064 and approved the request.

Public Hearings (Item 9) - see general protocol outlined above

9. Suspension of base business fee and business license surcharge from April 1, 2020, through March 31, 2021
Staff Report 041-20

AN ORDINANCE regarding the Business License Fee (VMC 5.04.090) and Business License Fee Surcharge (VMC 5.04.095) suspending the business license fee and business license fee surcharge for renewals during the twelve (12) calendar months beginning on April 1, 2020; providing for implementation of such suspension; and providing for an effective date.

Summary

The City of Vancouver requires businesses located in the incorporated city limits to obtain a business license and pay a fee of \$200 per location plus a \$90 per full time employee business license fee surcharge annually. On an annual basis, this revenue source generates approximately \$5.5 million for the City. The fees fund police staffing, increased over the last four years, and transportation programs.

Businesses renew their licenses once annually. Those that have already renewed for 2020 would see their paid fees covering year 2021.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has put a strain on Vancouver businesses, and many business have ceased operations to comply with Governor Inslee's orders.

The City would like to provide financial help to the negatively impacted businesses by suspending the business license fee and surcharge for a 12-month period beginning on April 1, 2020.

Vancouver Police Department has staff vacancies due to the normal attrition and will likely generate some savings during the remainder of the year to offset the forgone revenue resulting from suspension of the fees. Transportation will delay projects that were anticipated to be funded by the business license fee surcharge until 2021.

Request: On Monday, April 20, 2020, subject to second reading and public hearing, approve the ordinance.

Natasha Ramras, Chief Financial Officer, 487-8484

Mayor McEnerny-Ogle read the title of the ordinance into the record.

Mr. Holmes explained approval of this ordinance would memorialize the suspension of the business license fee and business license surcharge that was ratified in emergency order by the Council at its last meeting. He stated it is intended to provide local economic relief for businesses impacted by the pandemic at a total of about \$5 million in relief.

Ms. Ramras provided an overview of the proposed fee suspension.

Mayor McEnerny-Ogle opened the public hearing and, receiving no testimony, closed the public hearing.

Motion by Councilmember Paulsen, seconded by Councilmember Glover, and carried unanimously to approve Ordinance M-4293.

Old Business:

11. **Vancouver COVID-19 Emergency Response and Presentation of Emergency Orders**

A RESOLUTION ratifying and confirming Emergency Orders 2020-09, 2020-10, and 2020-11, as issued by the Vancouver City Manager.

Request: Adopt a resolution ratifying Emergency Orders 2020-09, 2020-10, and 2020-11.

Eric Holmes, City Manager

Mr. Holmes summarized the City's response to the COVID-19 pandemic since the last Council meeting, as outlined in his April 16 memorandum.

Related to the opening up of some limited facilities maintenance, Councilmember Stober asked if that pertains only to local governments or if it applies to any other entities, such as homeowners associations that maintain public spaces for their members. Mr. Holmes clarified that what is referenced only pertains to the City's determination of how to interpret such guidelines for City facilities.

Related to the opening up of some limited construction activity, Councilmember Hansen asked what kinds of technological innovation the City could utilize related to inspections so projects that are close to being permitted could move forward as expediently as possible.

Mr. Eiken explained the City can allow for video inspections of more routine types of work, but the projects still need to be considered essential construction under the Governor's orders, and the City has protocol in place to allow anyone to certify how their project is considered essential under those guidelines. He stated that if the City's inspection was the last step in a process, and the work could be done virtually, the City would probably not hold up that project, especially if it was a residential project.

Mr. Holmes then provided an overview of each of the new emergency orders before the Council for ratification.

Related to Emergency Order 2020-11 and the prohibition of public events being extended through July 31, Councilmember Fox stated she had raised the question during an EOC meeting as to whether some events could move forward if they incorporated modifications to the structure and flow of the event, similar to what the Farmers Market has proposed, in order to facilitate necessary physical distancing. She stated it would be helpful for the rest of the Council to hear the complexities involved with planning these events.

Mr. Holmes stated that staff took into account a lot of the logistical elements required in putting on these events, and weighed that with providing some level of certainty to event organizers about when they can plan on events opening up. He stated there is a lack of certainty as to whether the City will have staff available to support these events. He stated he also had consulted and confirmed Clark County Public Health about the reasonableness of time frames surrounding when groups of 250 or more would be allowed and safe.

Ms. Hannon stated this is one of the most challenging times for the business of Parks and Recreation she has ever seen in her career. She stated she is in contact with Clark County Public Health and CRESA several times a week, and she understands it is not realistic to think things will go back to normal in the next six to twelve months. For public events, the business model is based on moving volumes of people through their events and facilities, and even if up to 250 people were allowed to attend an event at one time, it would not pencil financially for event organizers or the vendors who support these events. She stated event organizers have been working closely with Parks staff, and most have been willing to work with the City to postpone events. She stated the other concern is the City is not seeing people observe the social distancing requirements at park as is expected even now, and she said public safety and health are the highest priorities driving these decisions right now.

Councilmember Paulsen thanked Councilmember Fox for serving on the EOC. In regards to public events, he stated there is the community aspect of people who do not like to be told they cannot go to events because a lot can happen between now and the end of July, but what is often lost is event organizers need to be planning for these events now and having a date certain can help them in their decision making. He stated he is supportive of this order.

Councilmember Lebowsky asked why the City would not just cancel all events through the end of summer. Ms. Hannon stated the July 31 event is an attempt to balance interests and give some certainty to event organizers. She stated the City was hopeful it could possibly permit some mid or late August concerts if the sponsors are interested.

Mr. Holmes added that part of what staff is balancing in their decision making is the recognition of the rapidly changing environment. He said there have been some indications at the state level of a slow opening of some activities, but the public health data just does not exist yet to make those decisions.

Councilmember Glover thanked Ms. Hannon for the explanation and care with which staff is making these decisions. She stated it might be helpful for the community to hear this thinking process.

Councilmember Stober asked whether the City has received notification of event cancellations. Ms. Hannon stated at least four June and July major events are wavering. Staff is still in discussions with event organizers with events scheduled in August and September, and most are waiting to see if

there is any change in the public health data to help with those decisions.

Councilmember Hansen asked whether staff has had any discussions with the Hilton as to whether event cancellations are impacting their financial expectations. Mr. Holmes explained the Hilton Hotel and Convention Center has an extraordinarily complex financial structure, and he would need to follow up with Council with further information.

Related to the extension of the revised Council schedule through the end of May, Councilmember Stober asked whether video conferencing could be utilized for Council meetings. Mr. Holmes stated staff would be testing video conferencing options with a target of using that platform for the May 4 meeting.

Regarding the Vancouver Farmers Market updated operations plan, Mr. Boldt explained the Market staff continues to refine its operations plan based on updated guidance from Clark County Public Health and the feedback provided by the Council.

Councilmember Stober stated that food security is especially critical right now, and decisions made in Clark County over a decade ago have resulted in a significant loss of local growing capacity, and the Farmers Market helps facilitate independent farmers' ability to sell directly to consumers without having to interact with larger grocers. But he stated he does want to acknowledge the concerns of residents related to the potential reopening of the Market, and noted a clear distinction needs to be made that a reopened market during the pandemic is not the same kind of public event many people think of the Farmers Market as being.

Councilmember Glover stated she is happy to see the precautions and concern related to the Market, and agreed about the importance of farmers being able to continue business.

Councilmember Lebowsky asked whether the Market staff has had much contact with residents who live adjacent to the Market. Mr. Boldt stated they have encountered some challenges, as they have to work through property management companies, but they are working to keep the residents updated.

Councilmember Fox stated she finds the Market has been making deliberate and great choices in responding to questions from Council and the community.

Mayor McEnery-Ogle asked whether people would be able to purchase vegetable starts from the Market. Mr. Boldt stated the Market was originally asked not to include those vendors in the modified plan, but they do work with vendors who can provide that.

Related to the extension of the suspension of on-street parking enforcement, Councilmember Hansen asked if an equity consideration would be given to on-street parking permit holders who pay for monthly parking permits but have been unable to use them either because they have been working from home

or because businesses are closed.

Mr. Eiken explained most people pay for on-street permits on a monthly basis, though some pay in advance for longer periods of time. Most permit holders do not pay for a dedicated parking spot. He stated the City is currently not issuing refunds for parking permits, but permit holders can cancel the next month's payment if they want. Their permit would not be held, though.

Mr. Holmes stated the original rationale behind the suspension of the on-street parking enforcement was related to providing relief to patrons of businesses in the downtown area, not as a relief to the businesses. He stated a permit holder could cancel their May permit, but there would be a risk of a permit not being available when that permit holder comes back to apply for a permit at a later date.

Councilmember Hansen asked whether the City could reserve their permit. Mr. Eiken stated staff had not evaluated that option yet. Mr. Holmes asked Council whether they would like staff to look into this option further.

Councilmember Stober stated the City should always be mindful of equity, but he stated if he was a permit holder he thinks he would take the risk and just cancel the next month's permit.

Councilmember Glover stated she had been contacted by quite a few employees who have not been able to use their permits, so she would like staff to investigate further.

Regarding the date to reopen City-managed community gardens, Councilmember Glover asked for clarification as to why they could not be opened until after July, as provided for in Emergency Order 2020-11. Mr. Holmes explained that was an error in the emergency order, and the intent was to open them up after May 31. He stated a new emergency order would be issued making that change.

Ms. Hannon explained that the community gardens on City property take significant staff resources to prep, and use of the gardens does not allow for a lot of social distancing. She stated staff is exploring a rotating schedule for gardeners to help with that or relocation of some plots to distance them out better. She stated the extra month gives staff time to prepare the ground and to come up with the best strategies for use.

Councilmember Lebowsky stated she supports staff exploring options for parking permit holders, as well as the reopening of community gardens after May 31.

Councilmember Paulsen agreed regarding the equity questions surrounding parking permit holders and would support exploration of some relief options. Related to the community gardens, he stated he supports finding a way to reopen them as soon as possible for people to utilize, as this also gets to the point of food security as well.

Councilmember Fox agreed regarding exploring relief for parking permit holders, and also stated she is encouraged the community gardens would be reopened prior to July 31.

Motion by Councilmember Paulsen, seconded by Councilmember Fox, and carried unanimously to adopt Resolution M-4065 ratifying Emergency Orders 2020-09, 2020-10, and 2020-11.

Mr. Holmes then provided Council with an update on the City's financial response and the measures being taking to mitigate the forecasted loss of revenues, as outlined in his April 16 memorandum. He noted the City's lost revenue could equate to a General Fund impact of up to \$60 million. In response, the City is implementing a fiscal response framework to include: minimization of the negative impact to the community, economy and employees; maximization of access to external resources to absorb the fiscal shock; maximization of the preservation of talent; maintenance of appropriate reserves for the next wave; and spreading the impact over 3-5 years. As part of this effort, the City is targeting a \$45 million expenditure reduction by deferring funding of internal service funds to accomplish \$17 million savings; reducing direct spending by \$13 million; and using \$15 million in cash savings.

Councilmember Paulsen stated he appreciates the proactive approach the City Manager and staff are taking, especially in having a contingency plan moving forward.

Councilmember Lebowsky thanked Mr. Holmes for the update and the work he and staff have done in being prudent with the management of the budget in past years.

Councilmember Stober stated he would love for the Council to receive an update from Regional Economist Scott Bailey in the near future.

Councilmember Hansen thanked the City Manager and staff and asked for frequent budget updates. He stated he is the only member of Council who was seated during the Great Recession, and taking a look at the reserves and measures being taken this time around, he stated it sounds like the City is in good hands.

Mr. Holmes thanked the Council, stating that if Council had not taken actions over the years to be fiscally responsible, many options the City can rely on now would not have been available.

SUBJECT 2020 Pavement Repairs Project

Key Points

- The City maintains approximately 1,900 lane miles of streets in its system.
- The purpose of this contract is to repair areas of failed pavement on streets that are getting treated in the annual pavement preservation program.
- City maintenance crews do not have the capacity to complete these pavement repairs before the annual pavement preservation contract begins in early July.

Strategic Plan Alignment

Goal 1, Objective 1.2: Ensure our infrastructure, including buildings and utilities, is safe, environmentally responsible and well maintained.

Present Situation

The 2020 Pavement Repairs Project is being constructed as part of the pavement management program. This project involves repairing failed pavement on streets that will receive a preservation treatment. Preservation treatments include microsurfacing, slurry sealing, chip sealing, and cape sealing. Most of the pavement, on the streets selected for preservation, is in fair condition and is ready for a preservation treatment. However, areas of failed pavement need to be repaired before a preservation treatment may be placed on them. This is work that has been done every year to prepare the streets for preservation. In previous years, pavement repairs were performed by City maintenance crews. This year, partially due to the loss of temporary staff stemming from the COVID-19 economic crisis, City maintenance crews do not have the capacity to complete the street preparation work required in advance for both these streets and the slurry seal-only streets before each contractor is able to start their work at the beginning of July. As such, the work needs to be contracted out..

The attached vicinity map shows where streets will receive pavement repairs. Corridors include NE 121st Avenue, NE 49th Street, NE 34th Street, NE 139th Avenue, NE 126th Avenue, NE Park

Plaza, SE 7th Street, SE Village Loop, E Evergreen Blvd, and Lieser Road.

On April 14, 2020, the City received three bids for the subject project. The bids ranged from \$576,000 to \$638,300. The low bidder was responsive. The bids are as follows:

There is a minimum apprenticeship goal of 3% of the utilized labor hours for this project. Granite Construction Company of Vancouver, Washington has submitted an Apprenticeship Utilization Plan to meet or exceed this goal by using approximately 90 hours of apprentice time of the estimating a total of 2,214 applicable labor hours for the project.

Advantage(s)

1. Will result in preparing the streets for the upcoming Preservation Project on arterials and within neighborhoods protecting the City's investment in its street network.
2. Will reduce higher future maintenance costs on City streets.
3. Will follow through on commitments and improve neighborhood livability.

Disadvantage(s)

1. Neighborhood residents, businesses and local traffic will be inconvenienced during the construction period along the corridors; however, the construction duration is short and lane closures will be limited, which will minimize the temporary inconvenience.
2. Construction will generate noise and dust in the work areas. To mitigate for noise, the contractor will be required to comply with a noise variance for night time work. The contractor will also be required to implement a dust control and erosion control strategy at all locations.

Budget Impact

The project is currently funded through the Pavement Management Program (\$600,000). Sufficient funds are budgeted to construct the project.

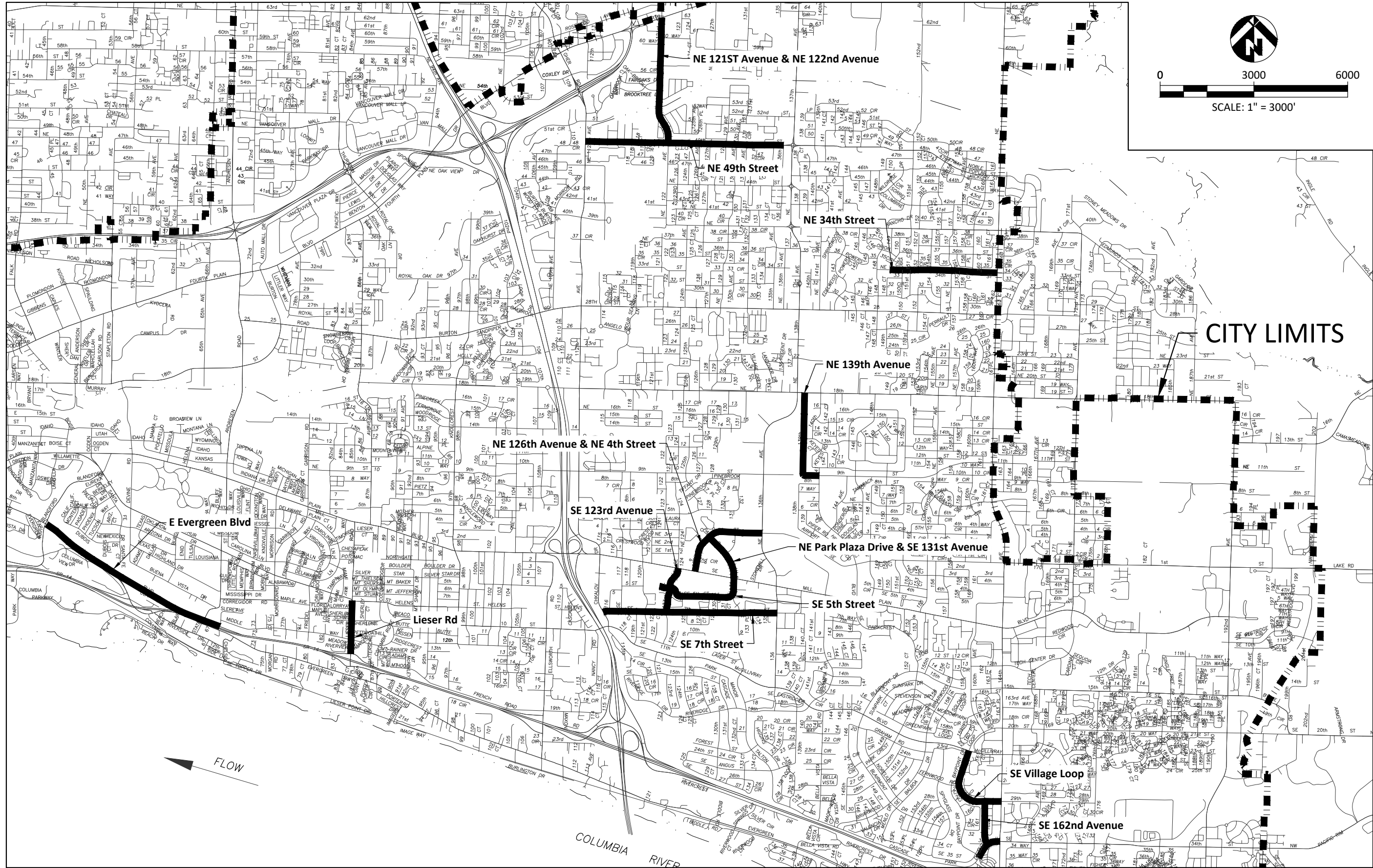

BID 20-11: 2020 Pavement Repairs Project

THIS CONTRACT is entered into by and between the City of Vancouver, a municipal corporation under the laws of the State of Washington, hereinafter referred to as "City," and Granite Construction Company hereinafter referred to as "Contractor," whose address is 16821 McGillivray Blvd, B210, Vancouver, WA 98683, hereinafter referred to "Parties."

WHEREAS, the City desires to engage the Contractor to provide public work and other related services for 2020 Pavement Repairs Project. Contractor has agreed to offer its services to perform said work per the City issued Invitation to Bid (ITB) No. 20-11 and all addenda thereto, Contractor's bid to said ITB, the Project Plans and Special Provisions, and City Council's approval on _____ per Staff Report No. _____; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has represented by entering into this Contract that it is fully qualified to perform the work to which it will be assigned in a competent and professional manner, and to the standards required by the City.

- 1. STATEMENT OF WORK:** The Contractor hereby agrees to furnish all materials, labor, tools, machinery and implements of every description necessary to complete the work in a professional manner within the time limits stated in this Contract for the construction and installation of the following improvements and will make all necessary arrangements for the obtaining of permits from the United States, State of Washington, and/or any of its agencies as may be necessary to do the work required and covered by this Contract.

This contract provides for the improvement of*streets within the City of Vancouver including pavement repairs, planning of roadways, paving of existing roads, minor utility adjustments, temporary striping, *** and other work, all in accordance with the attached Contract Plans, these Contract Provisions, and the Standard Specifications.**

The contract work for all of the streets except Evergreen Blvd and Lieser Road shall be substantially complete within 20 working days from the Notice to Proceed (NTP) date. Evergreen Blvd and Lieser Road shall be substantially complete with 35 working days from NTP.

Work including planing and paving on all the streets except Evergreen Blvd and Lieser Road shall be complete by May 29, 2020.

- 2. EFFECTIVE DATE:** This Contract is effective as of the ____ day of _____, _____.

The City reserves the right to extend the contract resulting from this bid for a period of two (2) one (1) year periods, with the same terms and conditions. Extension shall be by service of written notice of their intention to do so prior to the contract termination date. Unit prices for the extended periods are subject to review and may be adjusted up or down to allow for inflation.

- 3. E-VERIFY PROGRAM:** Contractor shall register and enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Department of Homeland Security E-Verify program within sixty (60) days after execution of this Agreement. Contractor shall ensure all Contractor employees and any sub-contractor(s) assigned to perform work under this Agreement are eligible to work in the United States. Contractor shall provide verification of compliance upon City request. Failure by Contractor to comply with this subsection shall be considered a material breach.
- 4. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES FOR SUBCONTRACTORS:** The Contractor shall include the language of this section in all tier subcontracts, and shall require each of its subcontractors to include the same language of this section in each of their subcontracts, adjusting only as necessary the terms used for the contracting parties. The requirements of this section apply to all subcontractors regardless of tier. The Contractor shall require all subcontractors to comply with all relevant federal, state and municipal laws, rules and regulations whatsoever. At the time of subcontract execution, the Contractor shall verify that all tier subcontractors meet the following bidder responsibility criteria:
1. Have a current certificate of registration in compliance with chapter 18.27 RCW, which must have been in effect at the time of subcontract bid submittal;
 2. Have a current Washington Unified Business Identifier (UBI) number;
 3. Have received training on the requirements related to public works and prevailing wage as required by RCW 39.04.350;
 4. Within the three-year period immediately preceding the date of the bid solicitation, not have been determined by a final and binding citation and notice of assessment issued by the department of labor and industries or through a civil judgment entered by a court of limited or general jurisdiction to have willfully violated, as defined in RCW 49.48.082, any provision of chapter 49.46, 49.48, or 49.52 RCW.
 5. If applicable, have:
 - i. Have Industrial Insurance (workers' compensation) coverage for the subcontractor's employees working in Washington, as required in Title 51 RCW;
 - ii. A Washington Employment Security Department reference number, as required in Title 50 RCW;
 - iii. A Washington Department of Revenue state excise tax registration number, as required in Title 82 RCW;
 - iv. An electrical contractor license, if required by Chapter 19.28 RCW;
 - v. An elevator contractor license, if required by Chapter 70.87 RCW.
 6. Not be disqualified from bidding on any public works contract under RCW 39.06.010 or 39.12.065 (3).
- 5. DELINQUENT STATE TAXES:** The Contractor shall not owe delinquent taxes to the Washington State Department of Revenue without a payment plan approved by the Department of Revenue.
- 6. COMPENSATION AND SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS:** In consideration of the promises and agreements of the Contractor as set forth herein, and in consideration of the faithful performance and furnishing of the work and materials required by this Contract to the satisfaction of the City, the City agrees to pay to the Contractor in the manner and at the times provided hereinafter and in the Contract Documents, and in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Vancouver and the laws of the State of Washington, the following sum as indicated, which amount does includes 8.4% Washington State Sales Tax (if applicable) \$576,576.00.

The amount finally to be paid is, however, variable upon the work actually performed and final payment will be made upon the basis of the amount of work performed and the materials furnished, and at the lump sum or unit prices fixed in the Contractor's Proposal and as modified by any and all approved Change Orders.

- 7. CONTRACTOR'S INSURANCE:** The Contractor agrees to procure insurance coverage as required below:

CONTRACTOR'S BOND:** The Contractor agrees that before it undertakes performance of this Contract, it will file with the City of Vancouver a Performance Bond and Payment Bond, in the forms prescribed by the City of Vancouver, in the full amount of the Contract price with a company authorized to do business in the State of Washington as a surety. The bonds shall

comply with the laws of the State of Washington, and especially with the provisions of Chapter 39.08 RCW.

- 9. DISPUTE RESOLUTION:** In the event of a dispute between the Parties which cannot be resolved by the contract managers, the Contractor and the City shall review such dispute and may attempt to resolve the dispute. Any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to this Contract or the alleged breach of this Contract that cannot be resolved by the Parties within 30 days of receipt of written notice may be submitted to mediation. If the dispute is not resolved through mediation, it shall be submitted to binding arbitration in accordance with the rules and procedures set forth in Chapter 7.04A RCW. The Parties agree to pay their own attorneys' fees and expenses.
- 10. EMPLOYMENT OF LABOR:** The Contractor agrees that all persons employed by Contractor and by any of its subcontractors and any of their lower tier contractors in work performed pursuant to this Contract shall not be employed in excess of eight (8) hours in any one day, except as provided or allowed by Chapter 49.28 RCW and WAC 296-127 and any amendment thereto.
- 11. PAYMENT OF LABOR:** The Contractor agrees that all laborers, workers, or mechanics employed by it or by any subcontractor in the performance of this Contract will be paid not less than the prevailing rate of wage for an hours work, in accordance with the provisions of the Chapter 39.12 RCW, and all rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. The State of Washington prevailing wage rates applicable for this public works project, which is located in Clark County, may be found at the following website address of the Department of Labor and Industries: <https://fortress.wa.gov/lni/wagelookup/prvWagelookup.aspx>. The prevailing wage rates in effect at the time of the bid submittal deadline shall apply for the duration of the project, no matter how long it lasts. However, if the Contract is awarded more than six months after the bids were due, the prevailing wage rates in effect on the award date shall apply.

In case any dispute arises as to what the prevailing rates of wages for work of a similar nature are and such dispute cannot be adjusted by the parties involved, the matter shall be referred to the director of the Department of Labor and Industries of the State of Washington for arbitration, and the director's decision shall be final, conclusive and binding on all parties involved in the dispute.

- 12. PAYMENT TO THE CONTRACTOR:** Progress payments to the Contractor shall be made within 30 days of a fully executed Pay Estimate and are in compliance with all contractual requirements. A sum equal to 5% may be reserved and retained from monies earned by the Contractor in accordance with Chapter 60.28 RCW. The City reserves the right to require Contractor to correct any submitted or paid erroneous invoices according to the rates set forth herein. City and Contractor agree that any amount paid in error by City does not constitute a change in the agreed upon amount; Contractor agrees to issue a refund of any overages paid in error by the City.

Release of the retained percentage or the retainage bond shall be in accordance with Chapter 60.28 RCW. Every person performing labor or furnishing supplies toward the completion of said improvement of work shall have a lien upon said monies so reserved; provided, that such notice of the lien of such claimant shall be given in the manner provided in RCW 39.08.030 and within the time provided in Chapter 60.28 RCW as now existing and in accordance with any amendments that may hereafter be made thereto.

No payment shall be made to the Contractor, however, until the Contractor and all subcontractors who have performed work shall have filed and received approval of a Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wage as required by RCW 39.12.040 from the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries. Said Contractor and all subcontractors shall also keep accurate payroll records for three years from the date of acceptance as described in RCW 39.12.120. A Contractor and all subcontractors shall, file a copy of its certified payroll records using the Department of Labor and Industries online system on a monthly basis. A Contractor's noncompliance with this section shall constitute a violation of RCW 39.12.050.

- 13. INDEMNIFICATION:** Contractor agrees to indemnify, defend, save and hold harmless the City, its officials, employees and agents from any and all liability, including but not limited to demands, claims, causes of action, suits or judgments, claims of copyright or patent infringement, including costs, attorney fees and expenses incurred in connection therewith, or whatsoever kind or nature, arising out of, or in connection with, or incident to, the performance of services by Contractor pursuant to this Contract.

In the event that any suit based on such a claim, demand, loss, damage, cost, or cause of action is brought against the Contractor, the City retains the right to participate in said suit.

This indemnity and hold harmless shall include any claim made against the City by an employee of Contractor or subcontractor or agent of the Contractor, even if Contractor is thus otherwise immune from liability pursuant to the workers' compensation statute, Title 51 RCW. To the extent that such liability arises from the concurrent negligence of both the City and the Contractor, such cost, fees and expenses shall be shared between the City and the Contractor in proportion to their relative degrees of negligence. This indemnity and hold harmless shall NOT apply in the case where liability arises from the sole negligence of the City. Contractor specifically acknowledges that the provisions contained herein have been mutually negotiated by the Parties and it is the intent of the Parties that Contractor provide the broadest scope of indemnity permitted by RCW 4.24.115.

- 14. OWNERSHIP OF RECORDS AND DOCUMENTS:** Any and all work product prepared by the Contractor in the course of performing this Contract shall immediately become the property of the City. In consideration of the compensation provided for by this Contract, the Contractor hereby further assigns all copyright interests in such work product to the City. A copy may be retained by the Contractor. Previously owned intellectual property of Contractor or any third party, and any know-how, methodologies or processes used by Contractor to provide the services or project deliverables under this Contract shall remain property of the original City.

- 15. PUBLIC DISCLOSURE COMPLIANCE:** The parties acknowledge that the City is an "agency" within the meaning of the Washington Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW, and that materials submitted by the Contractor to the City become public record. Such records may be subject to public disclosure, in whole or part and may be required to be released by the City in the event of a request for disclosure. In the event the City receives a public record request for any data or deliverable that is provided to the City and that is licensed from the Contractor, the City shall notify the Contractor of such request and withhold disclosure of such information for not less than five (5) business days, to permit the Contractor to seek judicial protection of such information, provided that the Contractor shall be responsible for attorney fees and costs in such action and shall save and hold harmless the City from any costs, attorney fees or penalty assessment under Chapter 42.17 RCW for withholding or delaying public disclosure of such

information.

- 16. AMENDMENTS:** All changes to this Contract, including changes to the statement of work and compensation, must be made by written Change Order and/or Amendment and signed by all parties to this Contract.
- 17. AUTHORIZATION AND COMPLIANCE WITH THE LAW:** The Contractor certifies that the person signing the Contract is legally authorized to enter into this binding Contract and that the Contractor shall fully comply with all relevant, federal, state and municipal laws, rules, regulations and policies.
- 18. RELATION OF PARTIES:** The Contractor, its subcontractors, agents and employees are independent contractors performing services for The City and are not employees of City; shall not, as a result of this Contract, accrue leave, retirement, insurance, bonding or any other benefits afforded to City employees; and, shall not have the authority to bind the City in any way except as may be specifically provided in the Statement of Work.
- 19. JURISDICTION/VENUE:** In the event that any litigation should arise concerning the construction or interpretation of the terms and/or conditions of this Contract, the venue of such action of litigation shall be in the Superior Court of the State of Washington in and for the County of Clark. This Contract shall be governed by the law of the State of Washington.
- 20. COOPERATIVE PURCHASING:** The Washington State Inter-local Cooperation Act, Chapter 39.34 RCW, authorizes public agencies to cooperatively purchase goods and services if all parties agree. By having executed this Contract, the Contractor agrees that other public agencies may purchase goods and services under this solicitation or contract at their own cost and without the City of Vancouver incurring any financial or legal liability for such purchases. The City of Vancouver agrees to allow other public agencies to purchase goods and services under this solicitation or contract, provided that the City of Vancouver is not held financially or legally liable for purchases and that any public agency purchasing under such solicitation or contract file a copy of this invitation and such contract in accordance with RCW 39.34.040.
- 21. ASSIGNMENT:** This Contract is binding on each party, its successors, assigns, and legal representatives and may not, under any circumstances, be assigned or transferred by either party without the other party's express written authorization.
- 22. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE:** The City, at its sole discretion, may terminate this Contract for convenience at any time for any reason deemed appropriate. Termination is effective immediately upon notice of termination given by the City.
- In the event this Contract is terminated prior to the completion of Work, Contractor will only be paid for the Work completed at the time of termination of the Contract.
- 23. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE:** In the event the Contractor is, or has been, in violation of the terms of this Contract, including the solicitation, the City reserves the right, upon written notice to the Contractor, to cancel, terminate, or suspend this contract in whole or in part for default. Termination shall be effected by serving a notice of termination on the Contractor setting forth the manner in which the Contractor is in default. The Contractor will be paid only the contract price for services performed in accordance with the manner of performance set forth in the Contract.

If it is later determined by the City that the Contractor had an excusable reason for not performing, such as a strike, fire, or flood, or events which are not the fault of or are beyond the control of the Contractor, the City after setting up a new delivery or performance schedule, may allow the Contractor to continue work or treat the termination as a termination for convenience.

- 24. OPPORTUNITY TO CURE:** The City at its sole discretion may in lieu of a termination allow the Contractor to cure the defect(s), by providing a "Notice to Cure" to Contractor setting forth the remedies sought by City and the deadline to accomplish the remedies. If the Contractor fails to remedy to the City's satisfaction the breach or default of any of the terms, covenants, or conditions of this Contract within the time stated time, the City shall have the right to terminate the Contract without any further obligation to the Contractor. SUBJECT Bid Award for North Image Park Improvements

Key Points

- Bids for construction of the North Image Neighborhood Park were solicited on February 4, 2020, and bids were opened on March 3, 2020. The City received six (6) bids.
- The construction contract is \$1,177,447.87, which requires a 3% apprenticeship goal.
- This project is funded solely with Parks Impact Fees. These park impact fees are from District C and can only be used for new park improvements in that district and cannot be used for other purposes.

Strategic Plan Alignment

Goal 4: Ensure that Vancouver's parks and trails system is the highest quality and most complete in the region.

Present Situation

This contract provides for construction of a new park in the NE corner of the city at 137th Avenue and 49th Street. The project consists of grading, ½ street improvements, new trails and sidewalks, installation of a dinosaur themed playground, 2 shade structures, Portland Loo style restrooms, ½ court basketball, picnic tables, benches, bike racks, landscaping and irrigation. The work is anticipated to be complete by end of year 2020.

A Request for Bids (ITB 20-07) was issued on February 4, 2020. Bids were publicly opened on March 3, 2020 The City received six bids, as listed below:

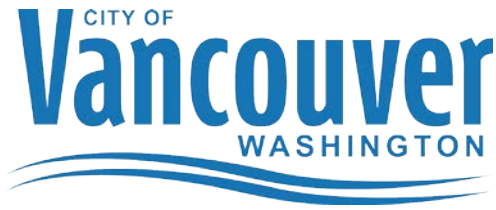

RE: **City of Vancouver COVID-19 Emergency Response Update and Ratification of Emergency Order**

Executive Summary

The City's emergency response to the COVID-19 pandemic continues to evolve, though is showing signs of stabilizing in an "interim normal". While we have generally maintained City operations in a Stay Home condition, with much of the workforce teleworking, working modified assignments or in an administrative leave status, some other operational changes have been implemented.

The negative impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on global, national and local economy continue to be extreme. New unemployment claims have increased to approximately 30 million since the onset of the pandemic emergency response, representing approximately 1 in every 5 individuals in the active labor force nationally. Ongoing closure of the economy associated with the efforts to contain the spread of the virus has translated into significant budget challenges for the City; actions are underway with the management team to address these.

Over the last two weeks, Governor Inslee announced modifications to previous emergency proclamations with respect to reopening construction activities, public recreation lands and elective surgeries. As of this writing, the Governor has made clear that the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order will be extended beyond May 4, but has not yet provided specific dates for its extension.

Operational Changes

While there have not been major operational changes in the last two weeks, beginning May 1 and at least through the month of May, there are nearly 60 Vancouver employees who are going on a full furlough due to facility and program closures, lack of work, or impacts to our budget. *This is in addition to the partial furlough/wage reduction that about 30% of our workforce is taking from May 1 through the end of 2020, and the potential of additional furloughs necessitated by lack of work or budget reduction measures that are still under development.* While these steps are necessary and there are expanded unemployment benefits that these furloughed employees will be able to access, it is nonetheless a huge impact to these members of the Vancouver team, their workgroups and their families.

My management team is working on additional budget reductions to address the projected revenue shortfall in 2020, which is likely to impact personnel. We will engage with the City's labor groups once the budget reduction plan is finalized.

Emergency Orders

Following the April 20 Council meeting, one emergency order (2020-11) was amended under Emergency Order 2020-12. This is attached and accompanied by a ratifying resolution for Council's consideration.

Crime Statistics

Attached for reference is an updated analysis of crime during the COVID-19 emergency compared to previous years and a five-year trend.

Economic Impacts

An overview of economic highlights and the anticipated revenue impacts will be provided to Council at the May 4 meeting.

Earlier this week, Governor Inslee announced a distribution of federal CARES Act funding that has gone to the state of Washington to cities and counties to assist with their COVID-19 emergency response impacts. The funds are being distributed on a per capita basis (\$30 for cities, \$55 for counties) that equates to a total of approximately \$5.5 million direct to Vancouver and \$26.8 million direct to Clark County. A copy of the distributions by city and county state wide is attached for Council's reference. Use of these funds must be consistent with the [guidance provided by the Treasury for CARES act implementation](#), and I am working with the leadership team to identify how these resources could be prudently deployed.

Operational Cost Containment

Department directors are developing spending reduction proposals for my review and consideration based on targets of 7.5% for police and fire and a 15% reduction target of the remaining budget in other departments through the end of 2020; these combine to make up the \$13 million spending reduction target. These targets are inclusive of the wage reductions and furloughs noted above, as well as other departmental reductions. From these proposals I will develop a final package of overall spending reductions that reflects service priorities during our immediate fiscal reality. While we hold a foundational value that we are in this together and will strive to be equitable, how we implement these changes might differ based on specificity of services provided.

Capital Program and Street Fund

Much of the City's capital program for the current biennium relies on enterprise fund revenues (sewer, water, drainage) and is relatively unaffected by the pandemic. However, the City's street fund has been dramatically impacted by events of recent months.

As Council is aware, the passage of I-976 in November 2019 represented a direct revenue reduction to the street fund of about \$5 million annually (\$1 million toward pavement management and \$4 million toward capital, and some of that \$4 million gets leveraged with grants). As part of the City's pandemic response to provide economic relief to our business sector we suspended the business license surcharge through March 2021, which equates to an additional estimated \$3.3 million revenue impact to the street programs. This impact was known

when enacted, and remains a positive policy response to the pandemic emergency in light of ongoing business impacts associated with a government ordered shutdown. Finally, there is an anticipated reduction in the real estate tax revenues resulting from the economic decline and a drop in fuel tax revenues that are distributed to the City based on vehicle miles driven. The cumulative impacts of the COVID-related impacted revenues (BLS, REET, MVFT and other miscellaneous revenues) is an additional reduction of revenue to the street fund in 2020 of approximately \$7.9 million on top of the I-976 impacts from what was originally budgeted, or about 38% of street fund revenue.

This revenue reduction necessitates a triage of both capital projects and operational maintenance – including the paving and pavement management program. City staff has thoroughly reviewed and prioritized all projects anticipated to be completed in the nearest future and determined which projects needed to be delayed within the context of the current economic environment. A number of different criteria were taken into consideration in prioritization of capital projects, including whether a particular project was leveraged via outside grant funds or the financial tradeoff of prolonging the asset life of the street system and the cost of repair. In particular, the fiscal reality is expected to impact the Columbia Street Complete Street project that has been the subject of much community and Council discussion over the last year. On Monday, staff will review overall street fund impacts in more detail, as well as a recommendation that the Columbia Complete Street project, in addition to a number of other projects, to be deferred at least until 2021. Attached for Council's reference is a more detailed analysis and impacted project list.

Reopening City Operations

Development of a reopening plan for the City organization, facilities and services is underway. Within the context of gubernatorial orders, this plan is expected to take into account our readiness to reopen in a way that focuses on employee health and safety and safety of the public we serve while optimizing our work effectiveness and leading by example.

Our operations are anticipated to look, feel and function differently when the City does come back to work. As we adapt to the reality of COVID-19 in our work environment, we will be experiencing a lot of change, from workspace reconfigurations to a whole different way of interacting with each other and the public we serve. There will be new health and safety protocols around in-person meetings, cleaning, publicly accessed areas, personal protective equipment (PPE) and social distancing. There will be fewer people in the office as staggered schedules call for some to telework while others work in-office. There is no doubt that this huge transition, this new reality, will take a while to get used to.

I am enormously grateful for the dedication, adaptability and patience that City staff has exhibited through this complex, intense and difficult time. These attributes, along with our caring and compassion for one another and those we serve, are the foundation for Vancouver emerging from this pandemic intact and more resilient.

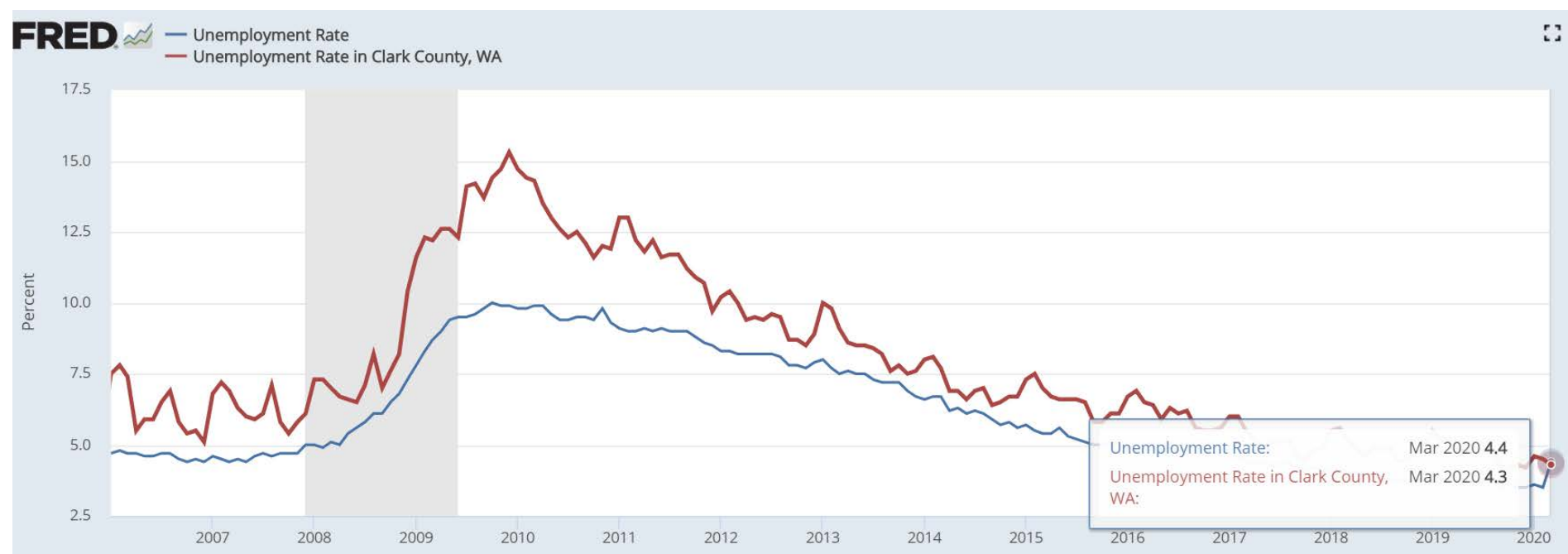

Economic Snapshot – Unemployment – March 2020

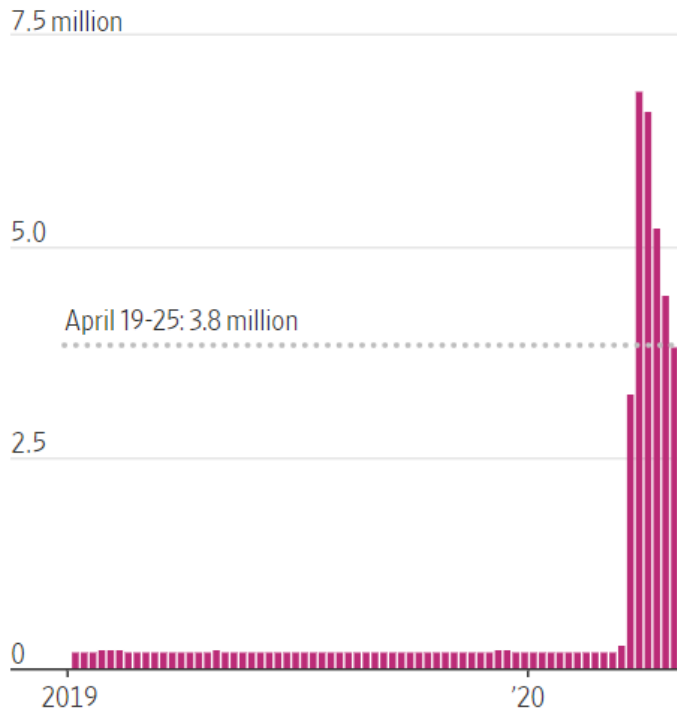


Economic Snapshot: Unemployment

- The unemployment rate for April is anticipated to be in the low 30% numbers.

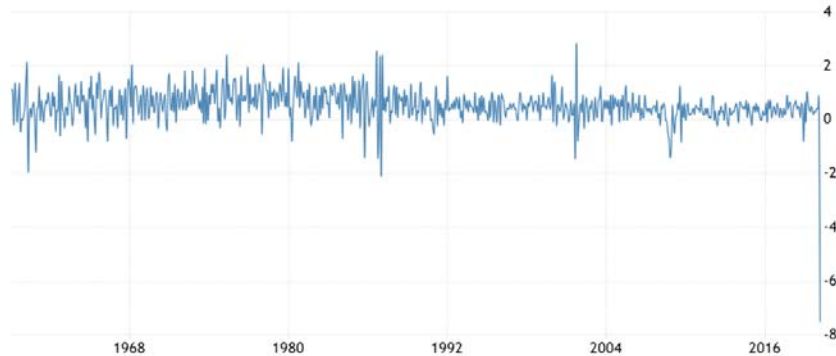


Initial jobless claims



Economic Snapshot: Consumer Spending

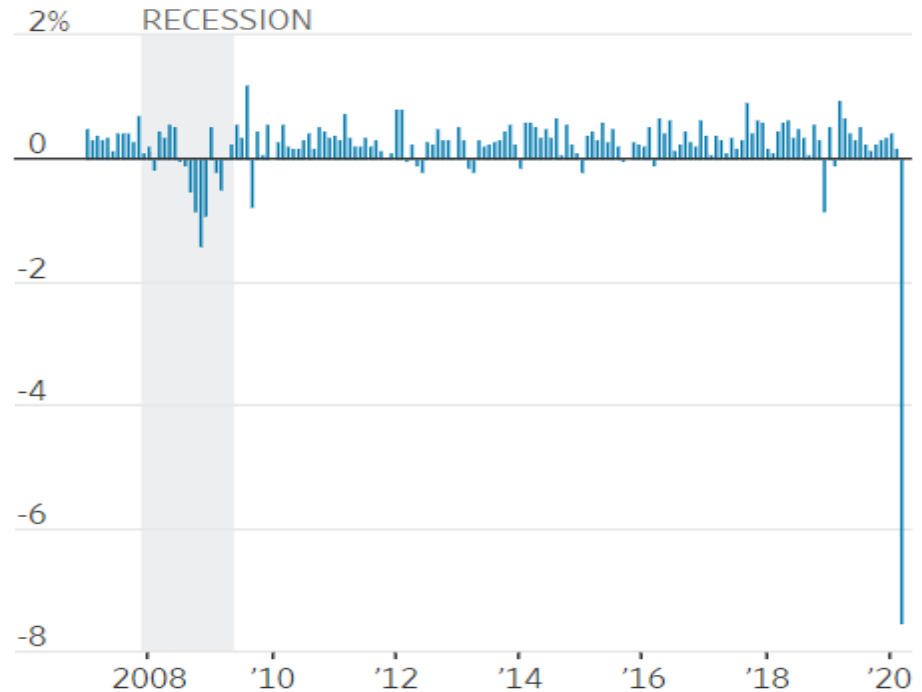

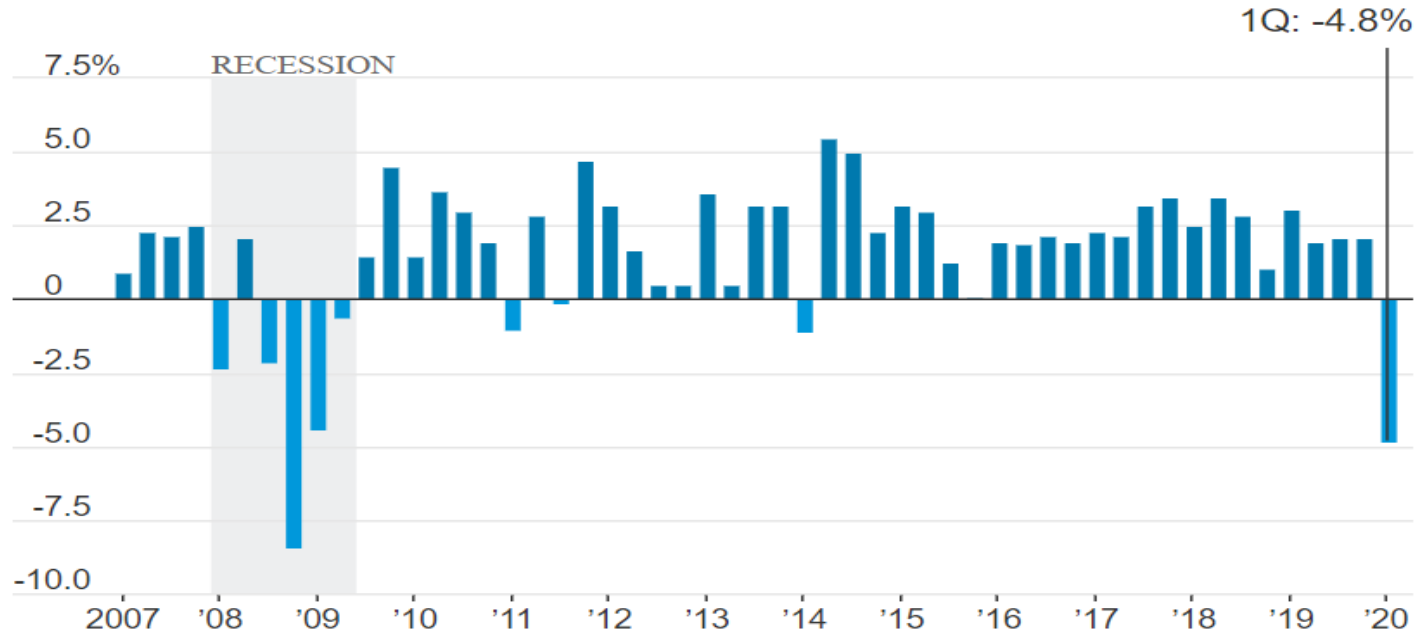
Monthly change in consumer spending

U.S. gross domestic product, change from prior quarter

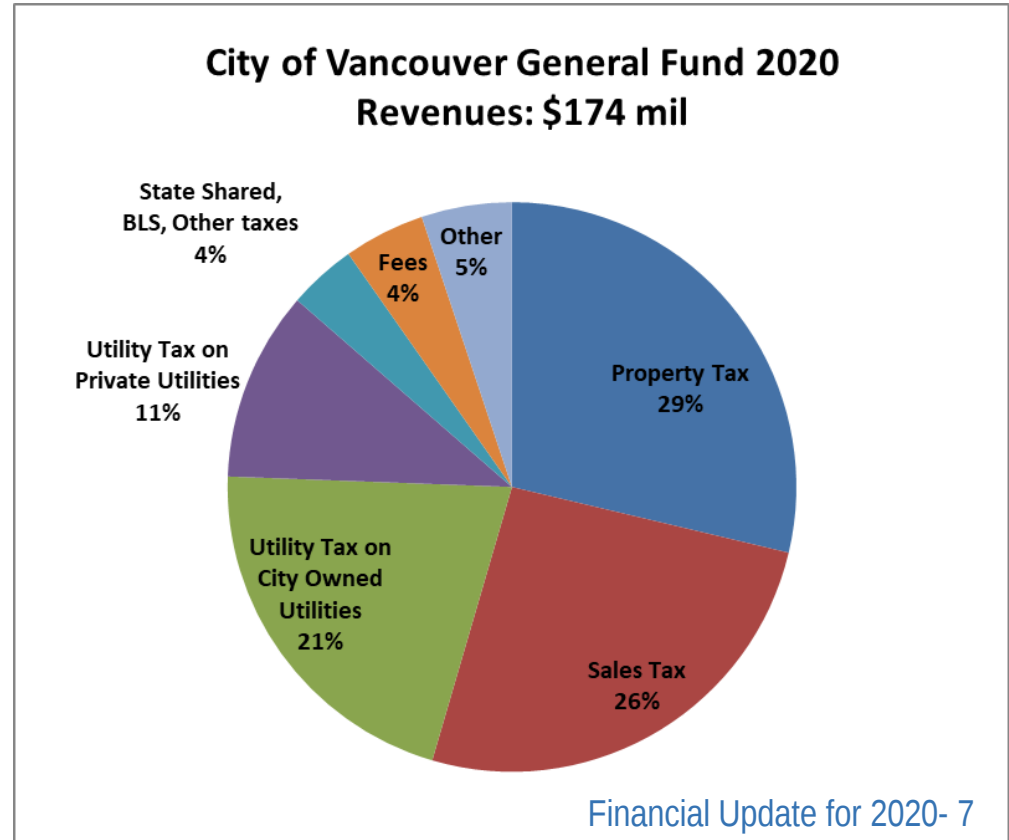

A RESOLUTION ratifying and confirming Emergency Order 2020-12 as issued by the Vancouver City Manager;

WHEREAS, at 14:30 hours on March 13, 2020, the City of Vancouver declared a civil emergency pursuant to Washington State Constitution Article VI, Section 11, Revised Code of Washington Chapter 38.52, and Vancouver Municipal Code Chapter 2.12, due to the public health threat posed by sudden outbreak of the novel coronavirus (COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, the City's Declaration of Civil Emergency No. 2020-01 was ratified and confirmed by Resolution M-4061; Emergency Orders 2020-02, 2020-03, 2020-04, 2020-05, 2020-06, 2020-07, 2020-08 were ratified and confirmed by the Vancouver City Council by Resolution (M-4063) on April 6, 2020; and Emergency Orders 2020-09, 2020-10, and 2020-11 were ratified and confirmed by the Vancouver City Council by Resolution (M-4065) on April 20, 2020; and

WHEREAS, following the issuance of Declaration of Civil Emergency 2020-01 and the foregoing Emergency Orders, the Vancouver City Manager issued [Emergency Order 2020-12](#) pursuant to Vancouver Municipal Code, Section 2.12.040, which authorizes the City Manager to issue Emergency Orders when the Council is not in session, following a declaration of a civil

emergency, subject to ratification and confirmation, modification or rejection by the City Council as soon as practicable following the issuance of such Orders; and

WHEREAS, the City Council agrees with Emergency Order 2020-12 and finds that it is appropriate to ratify, confirm and adopt the same;

NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY OF VANCOUVER:

Section 1. Ratification and Confirmation. Emergency Order 2020-12 as issued by the Vancouver City Manager is hereby ratified and confirmed pursuant to Section 2.12.040(C) of the Vancouver Municipal Code.

Section 2. Adoption and Incorporation by Reference. Except as otherwise provided in this Resolution, Emergency Order 2020-12 (attached), is hereby adopted and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 3. Notice. Pursuant to Section 2.12.050 of the Vancouver Municipal Code, Notice of Emergency Order 2020-12 shall be given as soon as practicable by such means are practicable to news media within the general area of the city, the public, the governor, the state military department, and the Clark County department of emergency management or successor agency.

Section 4. Duration. Emergency Order 2020-12 shall continue through its stated expiration until modified or terminated by the City Manager or Vancouver City Council.

AMENDING EMERGENCY ORDER 2020-11;

No. 2020-12

REMOVING REFERENCE OF COMMUNITY GARDENS FROM EMERGENCY ORDER 2020-11; ORDERING CLOSURE OF CITY COMMUNITY GARDENS.

At 14:30 hours on March 13, 2020, the City of Vancouver declared a civil emergency pursuant to Washington State Constitution Article VI, Section 11, Revised Code of Washington Chapter 38.52, and Vancouver Municipal Code Chapter 2.12 to address the public health threat posed by COVID-19. (Declaration of Civil Emergency No. 2020-01). The Vancouver City Council ratified and confirmed Declaration of Civil Emergency No. 2020-01 by Resolution (M-4061) on March 16, 2020.

On April 2, 2020, Washington State Governor Jay Inslee found that an public health emergency continues to exist as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, and issued Washington State Emergency [Proclamation 20-25.1](#), extending the duration of Washington's "Stay Home, Stay Healthy" Proclamation through 11:59 p.m. on May 4, 2020. In doing so, Governor Inslee expressly found that since Proclamation 20-25 was issued on March 23, the number of confirmed cases and deaths in Washington State has more than doubled. There are currently at least 5,984 cases of COVID-19 in Washington State with 247 associated deaths; furthermore, models predict that many hospitals in Washington State will reach capacity or become overwhelmed with COVID-19 patients within the next few weeks unless we significantly slow its spread throughout the state. Hospitalizations for COVID-like illnesses have been sharply increasing for the past month, and a large surge in the number of serious COVID-19 infections will compromise the ability of our health care system to deliver necessary health care services.

On April 20, 2020, the City Council approved Emergency Order 2020-11, Section 10 of which closed Community Gardens, Playgrounds, and Water Features through 23:59 hours on July 31, 2020, but directed the issuance of a new Emergency Order permitting Community Gardens to reopen once appropriate spacing and sanitation steps had been evaluated and implemented. In consultation with the Parks & Recreation Director, I have determined that such steps can be accomplished by 23:59 hours on May 4, 2020.

As of April 22, 2020, the State of Washington remains in a declared state of emergency. Clark County, Washington has recorded a total of at least sixteen (16) COVID-19 related deaths; a total of 2,957 people have been tested countywide, and of those, 306 were positive. As a result of the foregoing, I find that further action is needed to preserve the life, health and safety of the residents of the City of Vancouver.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DIRECTED AND ORDERED THAT:

As a result of the above-referenced situation, pursuant to Washington State Constitution Article VI, Section 11, Revised Code of Washington Chapter 38.52, Vancouver Municipal Code Chapter 2.12, and Resolution (M-4061) of the Vancouver City Council, I hereby Order that a state of emergency continues to exist in the City of Vancouver and further order as follows.

Section 1. “City Community Gardens” Defined. For purposes of this Emergency Order, the term “City Community Gardens” means the following seven public community gardens: (1) Marshall Community Park Garden, located at 1009 E. McLoughlin Blvd.; (2) LeRoy Haagen Community Park Garden, located on NE 9th Street, west of NE 136th Avenue; (3) Campus Garden, located on NE Campus Drive & NE 65th Avenue; (4) Ellsworth Road Garden, located at SE 10th Street and SE Ellsworth Road; (5) Fruit Valley Park Garden, located at W. 31st Street and Fruit Valley Road; (6) Bella Vista Park Garden located at Bella Vista Road and 20th Way; and (7) First Place Park Garden located at NE 16th ST & 151st AVE.

Section 2. Amendment to Emergency Order 2020-11 to Remove References to “Community Gardens.” Effective immediately, and unless further modified, extended or terminated by the Vancouver City Council or Vancouver City Manager, all references in Emergency Order 2020-11 to “Community Gardens” are hereby removed. All other provisions in Emergency Order 2020-11 shall remain unaltered by this Emergency Order.

Section 3. Closure of City Community Gardens through May 2020. Effective immediately, and unless further modified, extended or terminated by the Vancouver City Council or Vancouver City Manager, all City Community Gardens as defined in Section 1 of this Emergency Order are hereby order closed until 23:59 hours on May 4, 2020. This Emergency Order has no effect on any other community garden in the City of Vancouver.

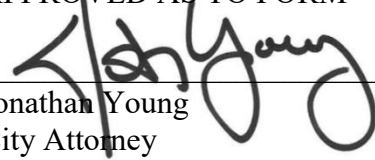

Purpose: To Provide data analysis of crime and calls for service (CFS) related to State of Emergency due to Coronavirus Pandemic

Data Used: Crime report data from RegJIN was used for weeks 12-17 for years 2018-2020, week ending April 25, 2020. First Watch data was used for weeks 12-17 for years 2018-2020, week ending April 25, 2020.

Summary: Crime Statistics—See pages 2-4 for details.

- Crime reported has increased by 14.38% when compared to 2019 and by 24.54% when compared to 2018.
- Aggravated assaults are stable but the number of simple assaults has been steadily rising over the past couple of weeks.
- Simple assaults that are related at domestic violence has increased by 43% when compared to 2019. Currently, domestic violence simple assault are 72.64% of all reported simple assaults. For years 2018 and 2019, the range was 56-58% of all reported simple assaults.
- Auto theft is up when compared to previous years and contributing to the rise in reported property crimes.
 - Beat 23 has consistent hot spot along NE 34th St, between NE 57th Ave and NE 65th Ave
- Burglaries continue to be significantly higher than normal and contributing to the rise in reported property crimes.
 - Commercial burglaries make up 34% of reported burglaries.
 - Increase in burglaries from residential and apartment complex garages.
 - Burglaries from commercial and residential construction sites.
- Rapes remain stable—nothing significant to report.
- Robbery is down slightly at -15% – nothing significant to report. The biggest contributing factor is reduction in reported robbery II (shoplifts) from stores.
- Theft has decreased slightly. Due the closing of most large box stores reported shoplifting thefts are down 40%.
- Vandalism is up 24.43% and contributing to the rise in reported property crimes.
 - 17% of the reported vandalism is domestic violence related
 - Burglaries, vehicle prowls and mail thefts are the majority of incidents where a vandalism occurred.
- Vehicle prowls have increased by 35% when compared to 2019 and contributing to the rise in reported property crimes.
 - Trail heads are being targeted near Bernie Dr. and Ross Dog Park in Beat 14
 - Apartment complex parking lots during the early morning hours throughout the city

Calls for Service (CFS) - See page 4 for details.

- CFS are down when compared 2019 (-12%), with the largest decrease in officer-initiated (non-PE) CFS (-24%). The reduction in reports taken could be influenced by the reduction in officer initiated activities such as traffic stops, premise checks, field contacts etc.

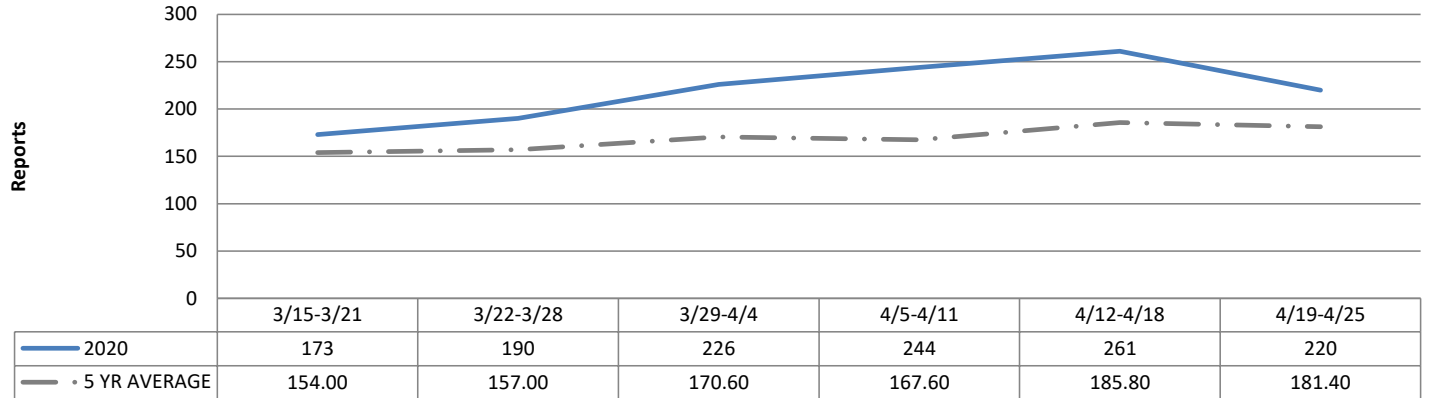

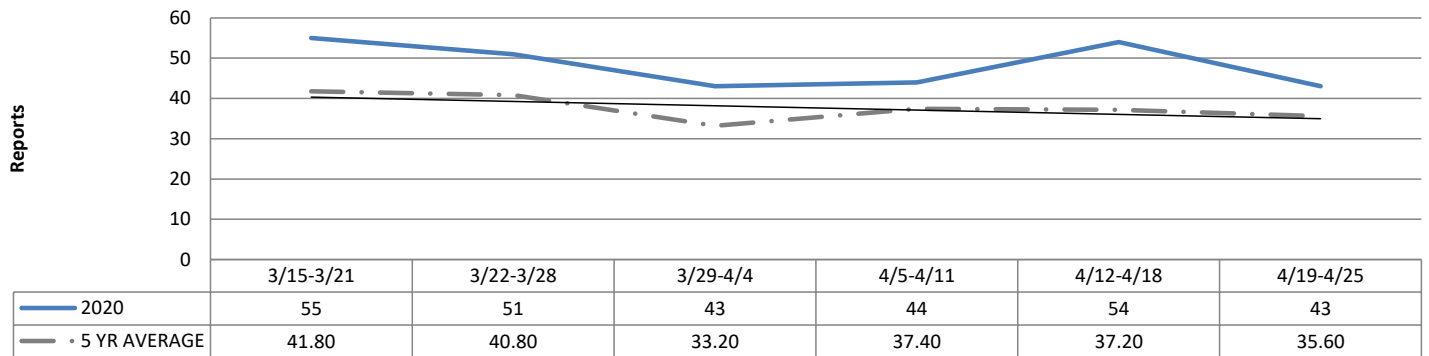

Property Crimes Weeks 12-17



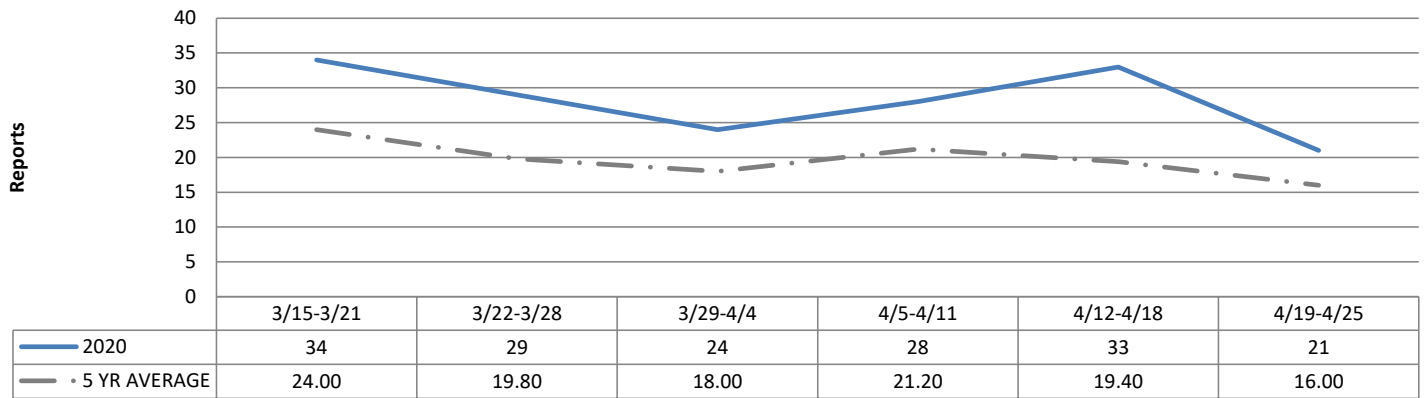

Violent Crime Weeks 12-17

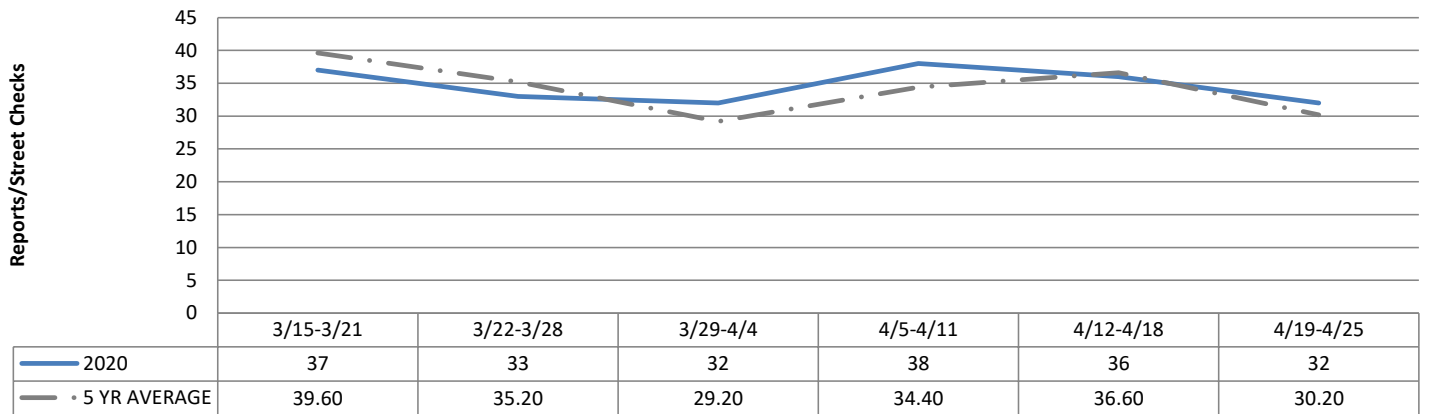

Domestic Violence Assaults Weeks 12-17

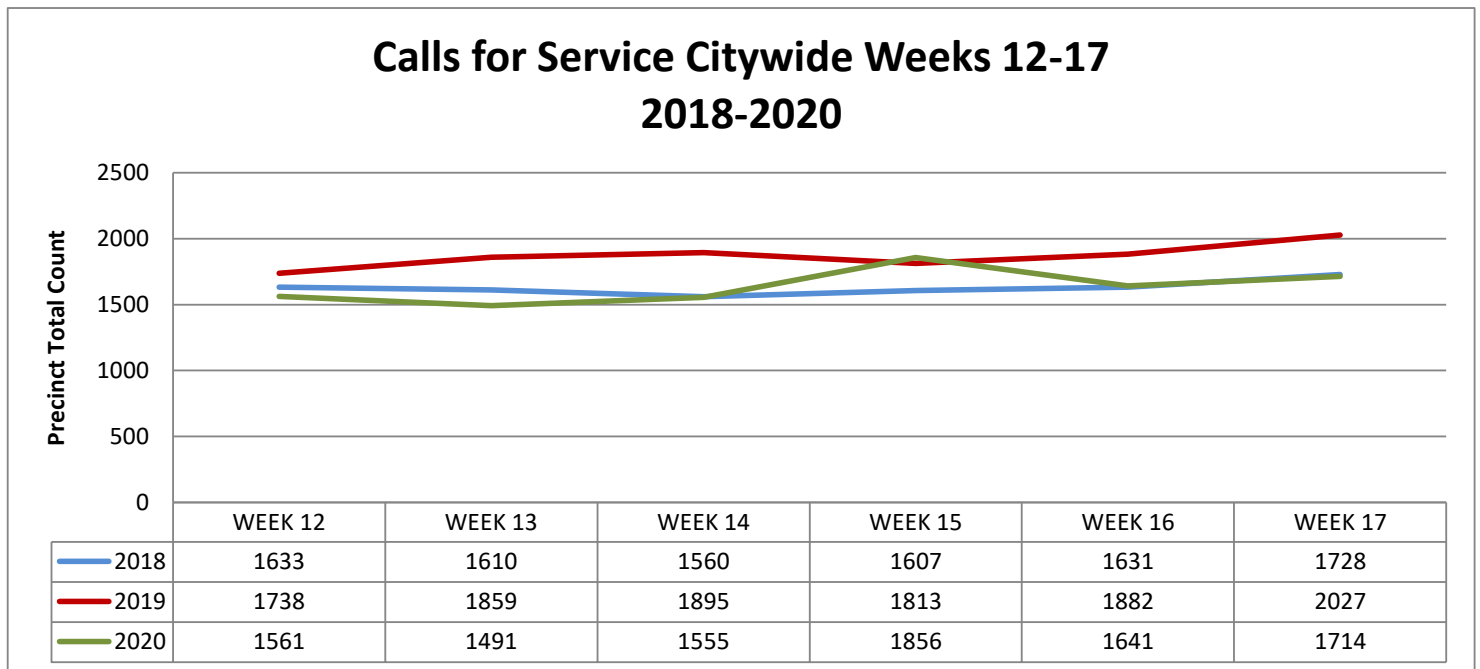


Verbal DV Weeks 12-17

RE: Streets & Transportation 2020 Budget Reductions

In response to the anticipated revenue shortfall associated with the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Streets & Transportation Division of Public Works is recommending a series of reductions and deferrals to projects and programs in both our capital and operating budgets that are supported through funds 102 & 103.

Revenue Shortfall Projections

The originally approved 2020 budget provided nearly \$37 million in revenue for the capital and operating budgets for Streets & Transportation. The passage of voter-approved I-976 led to a \$5.9 million reduction to the 2020 budget, which would have been solidified by Council during the Spring Budget Supplemental process. We're now faced with an additional \$7.9 million in reductions due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This is primarily the result of forecasted reductions to the State Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax, Real Estate Excise Tax and the City's Business License Surcharge, all of which are the primary contributors to the City's transportation budget. This information is further detailed in the table below.

Expenditure Reductions (Capital)

In response to the projected revenue shortfall stemming from the COVID-19 pandemic, a number of capital projects need to be reduced and/or deferred to outer years. Many of the capital projects currently underway include revenue from State and Federal grant funding sources. As such, those projects are proposed to continue in full such that those grant funds are not placed in jeopardy. The following summarizes the projects that will continue to move ahead as well as those projects that will be deferred to outer years.

This results in reaching the needed \$3 Million in reduced expenditures for the Transportation Capital budget.

Expenditure Reductions (Operating)

Similar to the Capital Budget, a number of projects and programs contained within the Streets Operating Budget will need to be reduced and/or deferred to outer years. The following summarizes the projects/programs that will be deferred/reduced.

Projects/Programs that will be deferred/reduced

- 2020 Pavement Management Program (Resurfacing and associated curb ramps, temporary help, professional services and overtime) - \$2.8 Million Fund Reduction
- Street Operations & Maintenance (Supplies, reduced contracted services, deferred equipment purchases, other) - \$1.1 Million Fund Reduction
- Sidewalk Management Program (Contracted services) - \$700,000 Fund Reduction
- Traffic Operations (Professional and contracted services) - \$300,000 Fund Reduction

These deferrals/reductions result in reaching the needed \$4.9 Million of reduced expenditures for the Transportation Operating budget. Together with the Capital budget, we are reducing the entire Transportation budget by \$7.9 Million to align with the projected revenue shortfall associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

Columbia Street Resurfacing/Multimodal Improvements

As noted in the reductions for the Operating Budget, the entire 2020 Resurfacing Program would be deferred until 2021. This includes the resurfacing of Columbia Street between 15th Street and 33rd Street. The resurfacing of this segment of Columbia was in advance of the implementation of the multi-modal “Complete Street” improvements that were approved by Council for the Columbia Street corridor.

Projected costs for the resurfacing of Columbia between 15th Street and 33rd Street are \$900,000, which also includes reconstruction of multiple curb ramps along the corridor as required for our pavement resurfacing projects. The costs associated with implementation of the Complete Streets treatment to a newly paved Columbia Street are approximately \$750,000. This includes the necessary striping to provide for buffered bike lanes and protected bike areas at each signalized intersection along the corridor, vertical elements located within the bike lane buffer, several enhanced pedestrian crossings along the corridor and signage. This \$750,000 is not included in any approved budget appropriation and was going to be part of the 2020 proposed Spring Supplemental Budget request.

The list of streets as part of the pre-COVID pavement management program is attached (attachment 1). It was originally slated to resurface (grind and overlay) approximately 8.3 lane miles (including 1.8 lane miles of Columbia), preserve (cape seal, chip seal and microsurface) 40 lane miles, and slurry seal approximately 39 lane miles.

With limited dollars, preservation and slurrying is a higher priority than resurfacing given the return on investment on keeping good streets in good condition is far higher than spending money on poor condition streets that require resurfacing. The cost to resurface per lane mile is far higher than preservation or slurrying that keeps streets in good condition thereby not requiring more extensive pavement management work if deferred. To do the 1.8 lane miles of pavement resurfacing work on Columbia, we would have to cut \$900,000 of work from the preservation work (would reduce the 40 lane miles of preservation work down to 23 lane miles) or eliminate the entire slurry effort (39 lane miles) and 9 lane miles from the preservation contract.
